LIBERALS AND TITLES.

With Liberal sneering at the tin-pot knight, with the Liberal premier of Ontario purposely absenting himself from the jubilee festivities to avoid honors which no one thought of thrusting upon him; with the Liberal mayor of Toronto ostentatiously refusing a title which was never offered him; with the ill-concealed regrets of the Liberal press at Mr. Laurier's acceptance of a K. C. M. G., it seems a little curious that Mr. Greenway's personal organ should complain that he—although a democrat to the hilt, like Sir Wilfrid—should have been overlooked when the decorations were passed around. The list, it says, might very appropriately have contained the name of Manitoba's premier, "for of all the men in the province there was no man approaching Mr. Greenway."

But the organ, which has hitherto held these colonial knightships up to public ridicule, is buoyed up with hope; it understands that Mr. Greenway's claims were considered, "and that it is understood that honor will be conferred later on," and it concludes: "Our premier deserves the honor, and should have had it." And this is the party which in the past has affected to despise the empty gregarious and glittering insignia—as it was termed—of a decoration, even when bestowed by the hand of the greatest ruler of the great Empire the world ever saw. The times have indeed changed—but not more quickly than these Liberals.—*Montreal Gazette.*

THE ERA OF CHEAP BICYCLES IS AT HAND.

There has been a fall in bicycles on the other side. The low grade machines are selling as low as \$25. A cut of 25 per cent in the high grades is also announced. A New York paper thus refers to the tumble in price: "No effective trust in the bicycle business, however, has been possible. The construction of the wheel is too simple, and there are too few essential parts protected by patents to make possible such an invincible combination for the maintenance of prices as exists among—for example—the makers of typewriters. These who have not insisted upon the very latest style in cycles, and have not been insistent upon patronizing only the most famous makers, have enjoyed the benefits of practically free competition this season. Next year they are likely to profit even more." The use of the wheel in cities will soon become so universal that good pavements and smooth roads will follow as a matter of course.

BICYCLE TRACKS HAVE BECOME A NECESSITY.

In building a road the first consideration always has been to make it possible for horse vehicles. That same consideration still exists, but why it is hard to say. The majority should always be considered first. The majority of travellers are pedestrians and good sidewalks should come ahead of everything. Next we have more and more who use bicycles than drive horses. A cycle track should be allotted to them. Thirdly a wagon road ought to come in. The latter of course is a necessity, but in point of importance it ought not to rank ahead of the bicycle path. 4 Times have changed now, the bicycle is King and municipal corporations might as well recognize it first as last.

THE DRUMMOND COUNTY RAILWAY DEAL.

The length of the Intercolonial from Montreal to the sea at Halifax will be 1,044 miles, says the Weekly Sun (Patron), and by the same railway to St. John, 755 miles. The length of the C. P. R. short line through Maine to St. John, on the other hand, is only 481 miles, while the Grand Trunk line from Montreal to Portland is 297 miles. Then, when the Intercolonial is extended to Montreal, it will have to compete with lines which offer routes to the sea, which are 274 and 456 miles shorter than its own.

The style for shirt waists are legion. Our illustrations portray one of the newest designs in this ever popular and fashionable garment. It is made of figured linen and worn with white linen collar and cuffs which can be made removable or attached permanently, as desired. The waist is encircled by a red leather belt and the neck finishes with smart tie in red satin (as red is, properly speaking, the color of the season). The fullest of the neck and shoulder edges produces a soft and graceful effect over the bust. A box-pleat finishes the right front edge through which button-holes are worked to effect the closing with studs or buttons.

The back is gathered at top and joined to a yoke lining with straight lower edge, the double pointed yoke being placed over the gathers and stitched firmly down on its lower edge, thus insuring a durable finish. A shaped neck band completes the neck when the rolling collar is made separately. The sleeves are slashed at the back and the opening finishes with cuff lapa, wrist-bands completing the wrists to which the rolling cuffs are buttoned. Plaid or a casing and draw-strings adjust the fullness at the waist line, and the dress skirt is worn over the full lower edge.

Striped and figured linens, Indian dummies, French organdy, tissue and figured lappets are among the chosen materials for making, with machine stitching as the accepted finish.

To make this shirt waist for a lady in the medium size will require three and one-half yards of thirty-six inch wide material. The pattern, No. 6751, is cut in sizes for a 32, 34, 36, 40 and 42-inch bust measure.
