The success of protibition would therefore mean that cider, being the principal drink, instead of selling for 15 cents a gallon would be worth 50 or 75 cents and apples would correspondingly advunce in price to at least \$2 and \$5 perbarrel. Every apple raises should vots for prohibition and look after his own interests instead of sacrificing them to the welfare of the liquor dealers.
