Unusual precautions taken by the police, the widespread publicity given the details of the murder and the chase ofter Crippen and his companion, caused thousands of persons to assemble on the water front for a glimpse of the prisoners and the men responsible for their capture. The vessel docked at 1 a. m., but the suspects did not come ashore until afte suspects and not come ashore until after daybreak. A great crowd had gathered at an early hour.
