

SMALLPOX IN YORK CO.—A Fredericton despatch of Monday says:—The house of a man named Green at N. S. has been quarantined for smallpox. Mr. Green recently returned from the Quebec lumber woods, suffering with what was first supposed to be chicken pox. The chairman of the board of health, however, has pronounced it smallpox. Mr. Green is now in the hospital at St. John's, where he is being treated by Dr. McNeil.

UNDER FALSE COLORS.—Members of the Miramichi Yacht Club were not very well pleased when they read, a few days ago, in the St. John papers, a report of a social function of the Royal Kennebec Yacht Club at which "Commodore Stewart of the Miramichi Yacht Club" was given considerable prominence. It might be understood that Mr. Stewart is not and never was Commodore of the Miramichi Yacht Club. He was once Vice Commodore of that organization, but the contract was such that it expired, by formal resolution, that his continued association with it was a reproach. At the next annual meeting his name was dropped from the list of officers. Why he should presume to speak for the Miramichi Yacht Club, therefore, is not easy to understand.

SHIRT FINISHING was never better in the Miramichi than it has been since Saturday. All the fishermen who could get their nets out made great catches. Messrs. W. A. and James McLaughlin and Wm. Gordon, fishers of the upper Sealab wharf took over \$700 worth.

Approximate statements of the value of other catches were: J. W. Parley, \$400; Wm. Gordon, \$400; Wm. Gordon, \$400; John Cobbe and Lake Mills, \$400; John McLaughlin and Joe Corrie, about \$300; Wm. Scott (north side) over \$500; Wm. Wilson, over \$400; other catches were made by Messrs. Wm. McLaughlin and Henry Kelly, Wm. Stevenson, the Moore Walls of Rock Heads. It is said that no net from Rock Heads to East Point took less than half a ton per tide while many took several tons.

A great feast of the catch is the large average size of the smelts. They pack out 40% "extras."

The run at Beuloches is also a good one and the buyers are paying five and a five and a quarter cents a pound for the fish on the ice. Some of them are rather overdone by the business as a whole.

The W. S. Loggie company have the privilege of the backing and pond for freezing smelts, and a novel and interesting event was presented there on Tuesday night. There were forty tons of fish, eight teams were engaged in hauling the fish, and 14 men were there with axes, manipulating them as they were spread four or five inches deep on the surface of the ice which being frozen. The barrels from which the fish were dumped formed a great barricade on the edge of the pond and the whole scene formed a rare picture in the moonlight. Fish representing a first cost of over \$5,000 were frozen in a few hours.

A Pulp Mill on the Matapedia. A Quebec despatch says:—"An important manufacturing enterprise is shortly to be in active operation in the province, backed by American capital. Part of the enterprise is the Matapedia River where there has been purchased by a syndicate of wealthy Americans, headed by Frank D. Wiley, of New York. The new company has been incorporated at Ottawa, under the name of the Mill Stream Lumber Company. A site has been chosen and the necessary arrangements made for the construction of an extensive plant. Although the limits already purchased are not extensive, the Matapedia district is rich in limits of the nature required. It is expected that the construction of the plant will be proceeded with in early spring."

A Peculiar Fatality. Last Friday at Bridgetown, New Jersey, one man was killed and two others so seriously injured that there is very slight chance of their recovery, by the bursting of a separator bowl in a milk plant. The bowl, which was made of steel and copper, burst by reason of the force of centrifugal motion, just as an exploding fly wheel does, and the pieces were hurled in all directions. Some of them flew into other departments of the plant, causing considerable damage, especially to the ice-making machinery. The walls of the building were riddled as if by shot from cannon. Pieces of metal were picked up 200 feet from the plant. Not only were the men injured by the flying metal but some of them were almost drowned by the suddenly released volume of milk.

The "Drains." The S.S. "Drain" is well detained in the river by ice, but it is hoped there will be a few days of sufficiently soft weather soon to release her. It was expected that the Dominion steamer "Minto" or the "Stables" would be sent to the Miramichi to break the ice so that the "Drain" might get out, so far, rather has come.

It was reported from Ecomineo yesterday by Lightkeeper McLaughlin that the "Stanley" came to put the Point about 9 o'clock on Tuesday night and ran up of the village, but she ran out again yesterday morning and steamed away.

A malicious reference in a local paper of yesterday's date to alleged delay in the loading of the "Drains" needs correction. The facts are that the steamer got to her loading berth on Saturday, 21st ult. about noon. The stevedores worked a half day that afternoon, as well as on the following Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and part of Friday—45 hours in all. The men would not work at night, a good many of the deals were dry and it was difficult to keep them in the slings. The men considered it too dangerous work to engage in under artificial light. In the afternoon they worked they put on boats and stowed 765 standards of deals, which would be considered good work even in warm weather. It is very easy for men who know but little of the subject to write maliciously incorrect statements of what was done and what might have been accomplished, but neither the stevedores nor the vessel's agent nor our working men ought to be accused for not doing what was impossible.

Chatham Town Council. A special meeting of Chatham Town Council, presided over by the Mayor, was held in the Town Hall on Monday afternoon to consider applications for the vacant jurisdiction of the Town Hall, tenders for wood supply, etc.

Applications for the jurisdiction were read from: John Ross at \$400 a year; J. L. L. L. at \$324; W. G. Morris at \$300; S. G. Sealie at \$290; Wm. Troy at \$297.

Mr. Troy received four, Mr. Lobban, three and Mr. Morris one of the votes on the question of jurisdiction. Messrs. Troy and Lobban received two each, and Mayor Murdoch gave the casting vote in favor of Wm. Troy, who was declared victorious for the position.

A claim by Mrs. Lloyd against assessment and one of \$110 for damage done to her property by blasting operations on the street in front of it, presented in her behalf by W. C. Winslow, Esq., were referred to the Finance Committee.

Tenders for wood were submitted as follows, by aid. Snowball: Geo. E. Fisher, mixed at \$2.25 a cord; Alex. McPherson, " 2.03; Wm. G. Morris, " 2.25; S. G. Sealie, soft at \$2.00; Fred. McLennan, " 2.55; A. Baldwin, " 1.40.

It was ordered that the tenders be opened for two weeks longer and the chairman was authorized to deal with Messrs. Gordon's and Baldwin's tenders.

Mr. Winslow was heard in reference to the town's assessment of the Maritime Building Co.'s property. He offered \$1,540 in full settlement. Referred to the Finance Committee. Adjourned.

Looking Ahead. AN EFFORT TO SECURE A TROTTERING COURSE FOR THE YEAR NEXT. Mr. E. Osborne, to whom efforts the St. Croix valley people are indebted for many good race meetings in former years, has addressed the following circular to the owners of tracks in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Maine:

"The object of this circular is to establish your opinion regarding the formation of a trotting circuit in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Maine, and to form such a circuit in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia during the coming season beginning in July and racing until all the tracks in the circuit have had their meet, commencing at one end and ending at the other."

At the general meeting of the Society the matter of pure seed was discussed and the desirability of our farmers obtaining reliable and clean seed only was emphasized. Some members expressed the belief that the mustard weed had been introduced with hayseed from the west, and the pure seed set of the last season of planting was referred to in favorable terms.

Mr. Murray, Esq., brought up the transfer of the lease of the Lobban property, now held by the Society, to the Miramichi Exhibition Association. He said that the transfer ought to be made, in accordance with the terms of a resolution on the subject passed at a meeting of the directors of this Society last year, when they voted to take \$1,200 of Exhibition Association stock, payable \$200 in cash and \$1,000 in real property the latter being the Lobban property leased by the Society. He said the transfer was necessary.
