



# WRECK HALIFAX EXPRESS

THIS EVENING.

Heavy Piece of Iron Clamped on the Rail Nearly Ditched Court La Tour, I. O. F. initiation. Carleton Cornet Band Fair in City Hall, West end. Sale and Tea in Oddfellows' Hall, Yesterday's C. P. R. Coming to St. John—An Investi-West End. gation Being Held

There are now only twelve men in the gang and of the dozen only one is a St. John man. For the past year the gang has never had more than a couple of citizens in it at one time. It has mostly been made up of strangers.

What seems to have been a malicious attempt to wreck the C. P. R. express bound here from Halifax yesterday afternoon, was made four miles east of Sussex. Some excitement has been caused by the act, and as a result an investigation will be held.

The C. P. R. express which is due to arrive here at 5.40 p. m., was in charge of Conductor Thomas Guinan, who was seen this morning in connection with the affair. Although reticient, Mr. Guinan admitted that an attempt to wreck the train had been made. He said that a piece of iron was on the track when the train passed. It was about three inches in circumference and from all appearances had been intentionally placed there. The train was running at a high rate of speed, about four miles the other side of Sussex. Suddenly a severe joiting was felt and as soon as possible the engineer brought the train to a stop. On getting out and walking back a few yards the train hands found a piece of iron on the east side of the track. It was then partly clamped to the rail but it was at once seen that the iron had been securely fastened and the weight of the train had loosened it somewhat. The iron was taken aboard the train and the journey to this city was resumed. Conductor Guinan states that there might

Conductor Guinan states that there might be a chance of the iron having fallen from another train, but he is not at all firm on this point. When it is taken into consideration, that the rices had into consideration that the piece had been fastened to the rail, this theory is hardly creditable. Fortunately the miscreants who were responsible for miscreants who were responsible for the act, chose a straight piece of track, and as a result the obstacle was not large enough to derail the engine or any of the cars. Had the iron been placed on a curve the whole train would probably have left the rails with the results which usually attend a derailment.


