OTTAWA, May 25.

The Editor of the Sun: Sir—In your issue of May 21st, under the heading "A Question of Veracity," you have published a statement which you reproduce, in all honesty, no doubt, at the request of the Montreal correspondent of the Toronto World, I trust you will, in all fairness, publish my following statement.

I was not in Montreal on the 20th day of last July, nor at any time during last session. I did not trespass the limits of the city of Ottawa from the day of opening of last session until the 15th day of August, when I left the capital to attend the Acadian celebration at Caraquet on the 16th of that month.

A KICK FROM FAIRVILLE.

Laborers Object to Importation of Italians to Work on C. P. R.

Yesterday there arrived at Fairville three carloads of Italians and the appearance of these people has given rise to quite a lot of dissatisfaction among Fairville laboring men. The Italians who number fifty, have been brought from Montreal by the C. P. R. to work on the ballasting of the line between Fairville and Welsford.

The ballast trains required in the work started operations about ten days ago, and since then the gravel has been dumped along the line. Laborers are required to pack it under the ties, and this job from Fairville to Welsford, is quite a big one, and one which would be of much advantage to those residents on the West Side who have not too much work to do at any time.

The Italian laborer, a man named Tracey, from Montreal, and the Fairville people in their annoyance at the methods adopted by the C. P. R. go so far as to say that the local track master should have been given the job, which comes in his sphere. The imported laborers are living in the three cars, and take their meals there. They have begun work at a rate of earning good wages. The job will take quite a while.

His Honor Judge Forbes said that he would impose the usual fines on those who were absent. He said that grand jurors were absenting themselves too much. The thing was becoming too common and would have to be stopped. There were people just as busy as they, who gave part of their time to the good government of the community.

The grand jury returned, after being out for an hour, with a true bill in every case. The first case called was the King vs. Sam J. Chisholm, charged with stealing \$60 from one Magee. A McKeown prosecuted and Chisholm was defended. The case was soon disposed of, a verdict of guilty with a fine of \$10 and costs of \$10 being brought in by the jury. Sentence was deferred.

The case of the King vs. John Flarty charged with stealing a coat from one Magee, was then called. H. A. McKeown for the crown and Edmund Ritchie for the prisoner. His Honor Judge Forbes, the complainant, was the first witness. He said he came from St. George to St. John in March with \$60 in a wallet. In the same wallet he was also a dollar bill, but in a separate compartment. The money was in \$5 bills, a few American, the rest in various Canadian banks. He first met Flarty at the station, who spoke to him about a small building he had for sale about a quarter of a mile from a farm owned by himself, Magee. They spent the night together at the Cumberland House in the same room. He discovered his loss as he was leaving next morning. No one had been with him but the prisoner. He charged Flarty with taking the money, which Flarty denied. That evening in a bar on Union street it was suggested that Flarty refused, but eventually allowed Fred Breen, the bartender, to go through his pockets.
