THE NEWS.

The world at the present time is in very great ommotion, even those portions which are not actually the scene of war or disturbance giving tokens of agitation which seem to portend that stirring events are in the mould of time. Italy is unsettled on account of the possession of Venetia and Lombardy oy a foreign power. Hungary is heaving with but half smothered indiguation under the domination of the same grasping state. Poland has begun to evince strong sympstate. Poland has began to evince strong symptoms of discontent. The moment that Louis Napoleon may take it into his inscrutable brain that his destiny calls him to the accomplishment of some new incomprehensible whim no one can guess. In the United States we have a civil war commenced, and the combatants taking breath, and making preparations for setting about the strife in good earnest.

The news, therefore, of the week and of the day is in great request. Besides these foreign embroilments New Brunswickers have their own little, and to them important, occurrences to attract and occupy their attention. A University with its head dangling between heaven and earth -a Government without any head at all--an expectation of important changes in the body of that Government—an immigration scheme half commenced, but not organized-and above all, a general election within a few weeks,-are subects sufficient to attract strong interest and

Each number is to contain two of these, with sixteen pages of letter press. The form being a large quarto gives opportunity for merly occ large and striking plates. While these, appeal-McCOY'S ing to the eye, will attract attention to the work, the letter-press portion will furnish such information concerning the Province as will rouse attention to its claims for consideration upon emigrants, where with a choice assortment of Dry Goods, tourists, and men of business. If Mr. Russell's work is extensively circulated, as we trust both for his sake and that of the country it will be, the result of its examination and perusal cannot be otherwise than advantageous to New Brunswick.
