HEAVY GALE SWEEPS THE BAY AND HARBOR

Seas Washed Railway Tracks on West Side and Immediate Repairs Will be Necessary.

There was a very heavy gale Saturday night and yesterday morning with the result that a tremendous sea was blown up in the Bay and Harbor, doing considerable damage. The C. P. R. sea-wall near Bouttey's Rocks, West St. John, was badly damaged. The heavy seas swept against the wall with such force that it washed the ground away under the railway tracks especially those of the New Brunswick Southern Railway. Repairs will probably have to be made early this morning before the express can pass over the place where the washout occurred. Yesterday morning hundreds of people watched the Negro Point breakwater with interest. The seas ran high that when they broke over the breakwater, the lighthouse at the end was submerged. Word reached George H. Flood, agent of marine and fisheries yesterday that during the gale last night the Southwest Edge Cape Sable gas and whistling buoy broke from its moorings and drifted away. Another buoy will be put in its place just as soon as possible.

Above Chin-Kiang there is a force of 8,000 revolutionaries with 100 guns, and it is estimated that 2,000 more are proceeding down the line of the Tien Tsai-Pakow railway. Fifteen warships now in the river under command of Gen. Chang, number about 11,000 men; well trained, well armed and strongly entrenched and fortified. It is believed that all the Republican forces are within one day's striking distance of the city. Rebels Active in Cheng-Tu. Hankow, Nov. 19.--Mail advices just received from Cheng-Tu, Szechwan province, which has been shut off from communication for several weeks, say that the rebels are active in every direction. The Viceroy is concentrating for the defense of Cheng-Tu and holds the country for a radius of twenty miles. Numerous engagements have been fought and loyalists have recaptured many cities. There were considerable losses on both sides. A letter from Cheungking dated Oct. 21st, says that the British consul has ordered all the missionaries down the river and it was expected that ninety would leave on Nov. 4th. A general evacuation of the province was considered probable.

OPEN CAMPAIGN TO EVANGELIZE WORLD

Layman's Missionary Congress Opens Here Today--Statistics of Foreign Work--Programme for the Day.

The Evangelization of the World, is the aim of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in the interests of which a three days' campaign will be opened in St. John today. It is claimed that the fifteen thousand missionaries now abroad will probably be able to evangelize 375,000,000 people during this generation, leaving 25,000,000 to be provided for. To evangelize this number it is estimated that 25,000 additional missionaries will be needed. To foreign missions in 1910 the United States and Canada gave \$11,908,000; Great Britain, \$11,055,000, and all other countries, \$3,827,000. TARRED GIRL CALLS TOWNSMEN WICKED

"Gossip's" Stories of Immorality and Shady Record False She Says--Jury is Nearly Completed.

Lincoln Centre, Nov. 19.--A jury to try Sheriff Clark, N. Simms and John Schmidt for assault and battery in connection with the tarring of Miss Mary Chamberlain probably will be procured tomorrow. When court closed yesterday nine men were in the box. Miss Chamberlain appeared in court today. "The gossip of Shady Bend have said everything they could to blacken me," she said. "Not a word of it is true. They say my teacher's certificate was revoked on the ground of immorality. All such talk is false and wicked." Farmers from surrounding counties who had driven as many as forty miles to hear the "tarrit" case and every citizen who could "knock off" his work, crowded into Judge Dallas' courtroom. Following Judge Grover's order that women or children be allowed in the courtroom because the Judge believed the testimony would be unfair to the ears of any mother or daughter "Ladies and gentlemen," the few women who have been attending the trial were noticeably absent. Judge Grover passed around a "quiet tip" to the newspaper reporters that it would be distasteful to the Court to have to exclude them from the courtroom for sending sensationally colored stories to their papers. The Judge's order to exclude women and children and to curb sensational newspaper reports followed a petition from the Women's Civic League of Lincoln county. Fourteen jurors will finally be selected to act as supply jurors in case any member of the original panel should become incapacitated. The police learned however, that there was no such team as the St. John's in existence and that the collecting was a fraud. It is believed by the police that the prisoner has collected over \$100 for this supposed football team. It is probable that VanBuskirk did collect of the description last year and got away with the coin.
