

**Grace Presbyterian Church
Brooklyn, Made Rapid
Strides during Past Four-
teen Years — In Good Fi-
nancial Condition.**

This must be noted here, however, that this work was not accomplished in a hasty manner. It was not according to the plan of twenty-five years ago of us men have forgotten and some of us may never see the day when the Presbyterian church is the child of the Presbyterian Union for Church Extension in Brooklyn. For without this aid the work could not have been prosecuted, and if there is one organization to which we should contribute more liberally than any other, and which organization is the Presbyterian Union for Church Extension, I speak thus full of gratitude for favors bestowed, and I know that the truth of my words speaks the spirit of humility.

But to come back. Of the fifty-five members with which we were organized, Mrs. William J. Bannerman, Mr. Frederick H. Cooke. We had hoped that there would be some others, but I did call that fourth man who was faithful to this church from the first breath of its life and who in death did not forget it.

From January 15, 1889, until January 15, 1892, Mr. Schenck labored with a young church of twenty-five members. He somewhat broke his spirit, the spirit of many a man in like circumstances has been broken. But he was not broken. But now for a few statistics. Since 1900, 1,400 members of the church have been received by letter, including charter members, and 475 on confession, making a total of 1,400 souls who have been received into the church. 200 have been dismised to other churches, 200 in the eleven years preceding the present pastorate, and 204 in the eleven years following. The church has lost 400 members, and should be mentioned as showing the growing stability of our beloved church, that of the 200 dismised in the last fourteen years, 150 were united with churches right in this part of the city, while of the 204 dismised in the last fourteen years, 150 were united with churches in other parts of the city. Of the remainder of 154, five changed their spiritual home, because of a slight misunderstanding, and 149 were dismised, however, with the pastor. Of the 149 who were dismised, 100 were received on confession of faith, and have come in, in the last fourteen years, 100 in the eleven years preceding, and 100 times as many came in, in the first eleven years, and after all, this is the thing that tells the story of real spiritual growth.

In these twenty-five years death has taken 113 times into our midst, as we called away those who were known to us, and who were loved by us, and like we cannot name them, but would let fall a flower on their memory in the assurance that when our dear friends are called away, we shall greet them in the Church Triumphant.

And now about finances. Through the hands of the trustees these twenty-five years have passed, not including mortgages, \$554,165, of which \$57,000 was paid for the new parsonage, and the fourteen thousand \$194,100, for the history. What a large amount is the


CENTREVILLE NOTES


