Newcastle, July 26.—The officers and board of the 14th held a recruiting meeting last night in the open air at Red Bank. Rev. J. F. McCurdy, B. A., presided. Addresses were given by the chairman and by Rev. Captain George M. Campbell, Rev. Captain G. L. Layson, Major Harrington, and Lieutenant Watling. Six men volunteered. The 14th secured twenty-six recruits on the Miramichi, week before last.

The Miramichi pilots have built a fine new pilot boat, the Admiral Beatty, which made her trial trip yesterday, visiting Newcastle, Nelson, etc. The vessel was built at the Miramichi Laundry & Machine Shop, Chatham.

She is seventy-two feet over all, eighteen feet beam, and draws seven and a half feet of water in ballast trim.
