POULTRY NOTES

That Nova Scotia lags behind the other provinces in the poultry industry was clearly shown by A. F. Curran at the Poultry Meeting on Saturday evening last in Middleton. In a most interesting manner he reviewed the poultry situation, showing that organization was essential if Nova Scotia producers wished to take advantage of the opportunity for expansion, and mean to hold their own against imported eggs. For instance, the average production of the Nova Scotia hen is only from 75 to 80 eggs, whereas hens of a good strain should lay double that number. Our best hens are producing from 200 eggs up to 300. In 1924, 72 carloads of eggs were imported into Nova Scotia from the West of Canada, and it was estimated that only two cars were exported.
The grading of eggs and the inspection service has served to increase the confidence of the consuming public to such an extent that although the per capita consumption for Canada was only 15 dozen in 1921, by the end of 1925 this has increased to 26 dozen. The Nova Scotia consumer has been protected from several cars of condemned eggs that were returned to the shipper. However, the quality of imported eggs is now consistently good. Moreover the producer has been assisted in the development of the domestic and export trade by the building up of the confidence of the consumer owing to the sales of graded eggs.
Calling and killing demonstrations are being arranged for evenings in various centres. Mr. Curran explained that undrawn dressed poultry was superior to the drawn article as they kept longer in storage and retained their flavor better.
The killing station for broilers of the Gunn Langtons Co. will open in Truro this week.
There will be another meeting in the Town Hall on Saturday night, a choice selection of speakers of organization. It is also desired to have arrangements completed as to the culling of flocks.

—NEW GARAGEMAN—
E. R. Mattinson has arrived in town and has taken possession of the garage property on Main Street which he recently purchased.

This course is recognized by the American Society of Engineers as the best home study course in automobiles offered in America. Besides studying the subject of automobiles, Mr. Mattinson has had several years of practical experience in Halifax, Oxford and other places, in all branches of general work on all standard makes of cars.
