CHANGE OF CURRENCY.

The Act to establish one uniform currency for the Dominion of Canada, passed in the last Session of Parliment, provides: "That on and after July 1st., 1871, the value of

the doilar shall be such that four dollars and eightys x cents and two-thirds of a cent, are equal to one round sterling. All money payable in Nova Scotia after July 1st, 1871, under any law passed before that day or under any bill, note, contract or other agreement, made before that day, and which if the Λct altering the curre cy had not been passed, would have been ayable in Nova Scotia Currency, will be payable in

Province of Canada, made specially payabe at Ha ifax, if issued before July 1st, 1871, are redeemable in the equivalent to Nova Scotia Currency viz: seventy-three cents of Canada Currency for every seventy-five cents of Nova Scotia currency; but all notes of any bank in Nova Scotia, or Do-minion notes payable at Halifax issued after July 1st, 1871, are redeemable in Canada Currency.
All silver, copper and bronze coins struck for circulation in Ontario, Quebec, and New Brunswick will be current in Nova Scotia after July 1, 1871, at the rate assigned to them in Canada Currency, and the silver coins are a egal tender to the amount of
