OLD SUBSCRIBER:—To put a hair-cloth lining in a skirt stitch the top of the hair-cloth to the lining, covering the upper edge of the hair-cloth with a tape; also bind all the seams of the skirt to prevent the hair-cloth coming through. The best finish for a skirt lined with silk is to make the seams of the lining separate from the outside and tack the seams of both together. To renovate black crape, skim-milk and water with a little bit of glue in it, made scalding hot, will restore old rusty black crape. It patted and pulled dry like fine muslin, it will look as good as new.
