borne in mind constantly, and the moiety of gines imposed and collected should likewise amply compensate the informers.

As to your inquiry about Indians getting orders for liquor from medical men other than the recognised attendant of the Band, the only remedy of which the
Department is aware, is what may be derived from the provision of Section 98- which throws the onus of proof
that the intoxicant has been made use of medicinally
upon the supplier or user thereof.
