PASSPORT AND VISA REQUIREMENTS FOR TOURISTS  
CROSSING THE BORDER BETWEEN CANADA AND THE  
UNITED STATES

Canada has not since the outbreak of war in September, 1939, made any changes in its regulations governing the personal entry into Canada of tourists from the United States. (The sole exception to this rule is that citizens of enemy countries are naturally prohibited from entering Canada). The United States has, however, announced that it is bringing into effect on July 1, 1940, new regulations which will affect the entry into the United States of Canadians and other persons who are not United States citizens. (Department of State press releases No. 271 of June 6 and No. 294 of June 13).

1. Canadians Resident in Canada

Under new regulations published on June 6, 1940, by the Department of State of the United States (Department of State press release No. 271 of June 6, 1940) all Canadians, who reside outside the United States, must, on and after July 1, 1940, be in possession of passports or official documents in the nature of passports and valid passport visas issued by a United States Consulate.

2. Canadian Commuters

Canadian commuters who have entered the United States with immigration visas will be permitted to enter the United States without new visas if they are holders of border identification cards issued by the immigration authorities of the United States.
