- Q.86 You say you applied an arm lock and got him to the floor?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q.87 Did you have much trouble?
- A. No, sir. He went down easily. He had to go down.
- Q.88 You said that the three of you decided, that is yourself, Bdr. Waterfield and Bdr. Hughes, that you would take him to the Guard Room by force. Those are the words you used.
- A. Well, we looked at each other and said "He is going to the Guard Room, whether he likes it or not".
- Q.89 What discussion did you have?
- A. That is just it, sir.
- Q.90 That you would take him by force?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q.91 How could you tell he had been drinking?
- A. I was close enough to smell it.
- Q.92 How many times was he on the floor?
- A. The cace that I put him on, and when Bdr. Waterfield hit him, twice.
- Q.93 Where were you when the attack by the accused on Edr. Waterfield in the hallway took place?
- A. The ration room is right at the hallway and when he hit Waterfield, he fell back in and I was knocked aside.
- Q.94 Were you in a position to see clearly?
- A. I saw Waterfield hit him the last time. He hit him on the face.
- Q.95 Can you say what the accused's attitude was, insofar as a fight is concerned?
- A. He had his hands up.
- Q.96 Who is Gnr. Hughes?
- A. He was at the time Bdr. Hughes.
- Q.97 Was Gnr. Hughes at the Grenade Theatre with you?
- A. No, he was in the kitchen when we entered.
- Q.98 Can you tell us how many Gunners were in the kitchen during this affair?
- A. There was more than one.

In the opinion of the Court it is not necessary to comply with R.P. 83(B).

The witness withdraws.
