and when the surveyor, Capt. Jim came to survey it, it was cold and frosty, and it was hard to climb up the mountain, and if you will let me have what Mr Green teld us we could have it will be all right because it will be good range for our stock - You are many, and why should I not got it now - That is all I have to say.

He is called and sworn.

- Mr Commissioner McKenna: Are you the Chief of the Seten Lake
 Band of Indians?
- A. Yes.
- Q. . How many people are there in your Tribe?
- A. Ar Graham can tell you that.
- Q. You want the Indian Agent to give us all particulars regarding the population?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Now than what do the Indians of your Tribe do for a living?
- A. Now at this particular time we have a hard time to make our living The whites tied up the salmen and the whites tied up the game, and the whites they have tied up everything outside the Reserves marked on this map.
- Q. Are you not allowed to hunt outside the Reserves?
- A. I mean this way I want to get more land outside the map.
- Q. I asked you how your Tribe made their living, and you told us that the whites tied up the game and the fish Now I want to know how have they tied up the hunting?
- A. The whites themselves they go hunting and they keep the game for themselves.
- Q. (To the Indian Agent) Do these Indians go off the Reserve and
- A. Yes, that is in the open season.
- Q. (To the witness) And in the open season can't the Indians com-
- A. The Indians go out and hunt to.
- Q. Do they got quite a lot of game then?
- A. You we hunt but we cannot get what we used to get.
- Q. But the Ind ians are better hunters than the whitemen, are
