St. Petersburg, June 24.—The official interpretation of the Emperor's speech to the delegation of the zemstvoists and Mayors at Peterhof June 19 is given in the following circular sent by the Minister of the Interior to all the newspapers: "The words pronounced by the Emperor during the reception of the members of the zemstvos and mupicipalities have been incorrectly interpreted by a portion of the periodical papers and several newspapers have gone so far as te deduce therefrom the arbitrary conclusion that the Emperor's words implied an extension of the Imperial rescript of March 3 to the Minister of the Interior in the sense or's words implied an extension of the Imperial rescript of March 3 to the Minister of the Interior in the sense of a convocation of representatives of the people on the basis of the existing constitutions of the countries of Western Europe, whereas it was clearly shown by the Emperor's words that the conditions of such a convocation were to be based on an order of things responding to Russian autocratic princesponding to Russian autocratic princesponding to Russian autocratic princesponding

were to be based on an erder of things responding to Russian autocratic principles, and His Majesty's words contain absolutely not the least indication of the possibility of modifying the fundamental laws of the Empire.

Strict Censership.

"Consequently the central administration of press affairs, by order of the Minister of the Interior, informs all publications appearing without censorship, that the Emperor's words can be published only in the form in which they were reported in The Official Messenger without additions or abbreviations. In order to prevent distortion of the significance of the Imperial words, it is found necessary to prohibit the publication in the press of any kind of deductions or interpretations which do not accord with the direct and clear meaning of the Emperor's utterances."

No Move for Armistice.

St. Petersburg, June 24.—There is not likely to be any further move in the direction of an armistice until the direction of an armistice until the plenipotentiaries are appointed and the time of their meeting is definitely fixed. Japan seems unwilling to discuss any new issue until these two questions are settled. This does not necessarily mean that all hope of arranging a suspension of hostilities before the meeting has disappeared. But as an indication of Japan's mood it increases the doubt as to whether she could be induced to relinquish temporarily the strategic advantages which she evidently believes she enjoys. Indeed, it might raise the suspicion of sparring for time until Field Marshal Oyama has developed his offensive and is actually in process of delivering his blow when Japan could easily plead that it was too late. The delay in settling the matter of the plenipotential is a therefore all the more deplored by those desiring to avoid further bloodshed. Both countries seem to be perfectly willing to name negotiators, but each evidently desires the other to show its hand first.

REPULSED AND PURSUED.

Russians Faring Badly at the Hands of the Japanese.

Tokio, June 24—The following efficial despatch has been received yesterday from the headquarters of the Japanese armies in Manchuria:

In the vicinity of Yingecheng June 21 a thousand of the enemy; infantry pressing our scouts advanced and when they reached Hsiatigyanchen, ten miles southeast of Wankautzkeau, our forces repulsed them with heavy loss and pursued them to the vicinity of Wel Yuanpaomen, After our force, which occupied Yangmulintau June 15, had completed their mission, they returned.

The enemy, consisting of three battaillons and four squadrons, with twelve guns, advanced through the eastern districts of the Kirin road and moved southward June 21. Our force, after a few hours' engagement, assaulted the offensive and completely repulsed the enemy, captured the neights and pubsued him.
