GRAND CONCERT FOR THE FORESTERS' HOME

Large Audience Present in Massey Hall at Toronto—High Chief's Address—Past Year has Been Most Successful in the History of the Order—The New Year

The popularity and success of the Independent Order of Foresters was once more demonstrated on the 12th inst., when the Massey Hall, Toronto, was overflowed by an audience who appreciated fully the program laid before them on the occasion of what is expected to be an annual series of concerts on behalf of the Independent Order of Foresters' Orphans' Home, which is being erected on Forester's Island, Deseronto. In point of artistic quality, the concert was equal to any that has been given here, and the figure at which admission was placed, being a popular one, there was not a single seat in any part of the great hall which was empty.

Dr. Oronhyatekha, Supreme Chief Ranger, who presided, was greeted with hearty cheer when he appeared. He wore the handsome Forester's collar which was presented to him by the Supreme High Court, to mark the twenty-first year of his holding his exalted position. With him, on the platform, were Mayor, Urquhart, Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Messrs. Thomas Crawford, M. P., James L. Hughes, Public School Inspector, Geo. G. Tedman, William Laidlaw, K. C.; E. F. Hearn, F. S. Mearns and G. A. Mitchell. At the back of the platform, on a screen, was a view of the new Home.

Dr. Oronhyatekha, in his opening remarks, referred to the excellent talent which the committee had secured, and, on behalf of the order, he thanked the audience for their presence to show sympathy with the particular work the Order had in hand. Continuing, he said:

"The Order has just ended the most successful year in the history of the Order, extending over a quarter of a century. We have added to the membership 38,000 during the year 1903. When I tell you it took over 20 years to accumulate the first \$1,000,000, I know all present will be gratified to learn that the last million has been added within ten months—Applause. While looking to adding to our surplus funds, and thereby strengthening the expansion of the Order, we have distributed over \$7,000 to widows and orphans, and distressed members for every day in the 365, and yet we have added on an average over \$100,000 of surplus funds for the future use of the Order. The Independent Order of Foresters, having established the financial part of the work upon a firm basis, is just entering upon the fraternal part of it. Last summer it was announced that the Independent Order of Foresters proposed to build a home for the orphans of the Order on Forester's Island, near Deseronto. The work was begun in October, and to-day a building, 50 feet by 150, and four stories high, is more than half completed. The architect in charge is Mr. Gouinlock, so chitney in charge is Mr. Gouinlock, so you will have confidence in the character of the work, which is being put on the building. That confidence will be enhanced when I tell you that while Mr. Gouinlock is in charge of the work, and I know it is in competent hands, I am in charge of Mr. Gouinlock—Laughter and applause. Indeed, I may go further, and tell you that most of the workers are Mohawk Indians, and that there has been no strike on the work since it began. Understanding the fact that on one occasion I left it to duty to ask them to work for an extended time over that for which they were paid, as I did not want them to quit work till a certain portion of the building was made secure, every man stayed there and worked till nine in the evening. Everything being so secure, they rested from their labors—Applause.

The scope of the work is a very extended one. We propose to bring the benefit of the Home to every Forester in the country. What I mean by that is that the Order will pay the expenses, if necessary, of orphans, and bring them to the Home, let their residence be in Newfoundland, British Columbia, or California. There is just one feature in addition to the education, clothing and feeding of these orphans, and that is a very important feature, to which I will briefly direct your attention. This is the fact, that these children, brought from every part of the continent in which our Order is operating to-day, will be brought up and educated so that they shall be, on arriving at maturity, in every

way qualified to become useful citizens of the community. I hope a great many of them will become citizens of Canada, but of whatever country they become citizens, I trust and hope that when they have graduated from this Forester's Home they will go to their respective countries, if they do not remain in Canada, and carry with them such memories of our great country, our glorious climate and our magnificent people that wherever their lot may be cast they will always have a pleasant memory and a good word for Canada—Applause. Additions to the building will be made by the erection of cottages."

The concert was under the direction of Mr. Harold Jarvis, and the artists who took part in addition to him were: Mrs. Calder Leonard, soprano, Detroit; Mrs. Helen Myrick Hafer, reader, Detroit; Mr. Donald Macgregor, baritone, D. H. C. R. White, entertainer, and Mrs. H. M. Blight, accompanist.

During the intermission of the program the High Chief presented Past Chief Rangers' gold badges to Bro. Geo. A. Mitchell, D. S. C. R., and Bro. W. S. G. Tedman, D. H. C. R. The presentation was made in the customary happy style of the High Chief and it is a question to-day whether the recipients feel more proud of the badges or of Dr. Oronhyatekha's commendation to them. To Mr. Tedman he said the badge was an appreciation upon behalf of himself and the Executive Council of the Order. To Mr. Mitchell he presented the badge as a testimony to his magnificent services.

The concert was brought to a close in a happy fashion. The High Chief Ranger announced that the concert had netted the sum of \$300 to the Orphans' Home Fund, and following that there was a double reason for the hearty singing of the National Anthem.
