

CHURCHES.

Episcopal Church, situated on Wellington Street; built of brick; completed in 1861. at a cost of \$7,600. F. W. Sandys, D. D., Rural Dean; Geo. D. Ross, warden; Thomas Jones, sexton. Number that can be seated 500.

Canada Presbyterian Church; situated on Adelaide Street; built in 1853; size, 35 $\times$ 50; cost \$2,300; number that can be seated, 300. Rev. Angus McColl, minister; residence, Chatham North.

St. Joseph Church—Roman Catholic—situated on Wellington Street; built of brick, in 1850; size, 60 $\times$ 100, with wings; cost \$10,000; seats 600. Rev. Charles Counilleau, rector. Revds. F. Dumortier, William Goecklen, and J. Rymel, priests.

Established Church of Scotland; situated on Wellington Street; built in 1843; size, 35 $\times$ 50; seats 300. Rev. John Rannie, minister; residence—Park Street.

Baptist Church—(colored)—situated on King Street; built in 1862; size, 30 $\times$ 50; cost 600; seats 200. Rev. D. W. Anderson, minister.

British Methodist Episcopal Church—Victoria Chapel—(colored) situated on Princess Street; built in 1857; size, 50 $\times$ 75; cost \$4,000; seats 900. Rev. Walter Hawkins, minister; residence, Princess Street.

Tabernacle Baptist Church—(colored) situated on King and William Streets; built in 1853; size, 40 $\times$ 60; cost \$4,000; seats 500. No settled minister.

Primitive Methodist Church, situated on Head street, North Chatham; built of frame, in 1863.

Episcopal Methodist Church, situated on King street.

Wesleyan Methodist Church—situated on King Street; built of frame, in 1848; size, 40 $\times$ 60; seats 350; cost \$3,000. Rev. L. Warner, and William Benning, ministers.

African Union Methodist Church—[colored]—situated on King Street; built of frame, in 1857; size, 60 $\times$ 30; seats 200. Rev. Wm. Walker, minister; residence, King Street.

POST OFFICE:

Situated between King and Wellington Streets. Open during the winter, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.; during the summer, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; not open on Sundays. Mails three times a day from the east, and twice a day from the west. Benjamin Barfoot, post-master; S. Barfoot, assistant; H. Verrall and William Buist, clerks.

EDUCATIONAL.

SENIOR COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.—Pleasantly situated in the North-east corner of the town, in the vicinity of the county buildings. It is a large and commodious brick structure, with a dwelling-house and garden attached. It was erected in the year 1863, at a cost of \$5,800. The school is open to both males and females. The average attendance is about forty—males and females being in about equal numbers. The standard of admission
