Special thanks are due to Mr. Jos. McCuaig, for kindly teaching the boys gratuitously until a paid instructor was provided.

The Managers would express their thanks to the Captains of the various ferry boats and steamers: to Alderman Harry Piper of the "Zoo," and to kind friends, including those who sent liberal donations at Christmas (thus sharing their dinner with the boys) for their consideration in affording opportunities for pleasure and enjoyment; also to the butchers on Yonge Street and at the Market, and the grocers and bakers throughout the city who have assisted in supplying the wants of the institution, and to the editors of the various morning and evening papers for inserting gratuitously matters relating to the institution; to the Trustees of the Public School Board for consideration and attention bestowed upon the education of the boys, and to Mr. J. L. Hughes, Inspector of Public Schools, for the kind courtesy he has ever shown to them.
