Buller's several Reports on the State of Education in Lower Canada; also Returns made to Commission on the affairs of the Jesuit's Estates, and on Report of Mr. Dunken, the Secretary, the Chief Commissioner, in referring to the difficulty he had to contend with to obtain any accurate statistical information, thus speaks of the city of Quebec:—

"The only accurate details I am able to formish, and I venture to call them accurate—
not from my own knowledge, but from my complete confidence in the gentleman" who collected them, relate to the City and Suburbs of Quebec. It was a work of no small labour, as he had no authentic guide in his search, and was literally obliged to hunt out schools in every street and alley within that large circle; and as he made the most minute enquiries respecting each, the following are the most important facts that they present:—
"There are in Quebec 22 boys' and 23

"There are in Quebec 22 boys' and 23 girls's schools, ame 3 which latter are not, however, included tiose of the Ursuline and Sœurs de la Congrégation, and other Nun-

'The total number of boys in regular attendance is, 1,222, of whom 581 are English, and 641 French Canadiaus. The total number of girls is 977, of whoe 365 are English and 512 French. Accordingly, the gress number of scholars in regular attendance is 2,199. Of this number 548 can read and write well enough for ordinary purposes, and only 490 learn both languages, 46 English children learning French, and 444 French learning English. The whole yearly cost of these schools, arising from subscriptions, public grants, and pupils' fees, amount to £4,400. Many of the masters and miststesses are utterly incompetent; and it is obvious that, under a judicious system, twice the number of children might be brought together at half the cost, in a quarter of the number of schools, and receive an education incalculably superior."
