DIRECTORS' REPORT.

Your Directors have pleasure in submitting their 35th Annual Report, showing the transactions of the year, and the financial standing of the company as at December 31st, 1904.

INSURANCE ACCOUNT.—The volume of new business exceeds that of any former year, being 3,322 Policies for \$5,481,168, all of which, except \$95,000, was written within the Dominion.

INCOME.—The total income was \$1,725,368.90, being \$1,375,394.60 for premiums, and \$350,974.30 for interest.

DISBURSEMENTS.—The payments to Policyholders amounted to \$2,615,344.40 and consisted of Death Claims, \$2,361,902; Endowments, \$166,663; Purchased Policies, \$23,778.50; Surplus, \$58,152.40; and Annuities, \$5,679.90.

THE EXPENSES AND TAXES were \$300,897, being 17.4 per cent. of the total income, or about 1 per cent. less than in 1903.

ASSETS.—The cash assets are \$7,794,088.35 and the total assets \$8,220,530.45, showing gains of \$868,840 and \$27,725.75 respectively.

LIABILITIES.—The liabilities were again computed on the Combined Experienced Table with a 4 per cent. interest for all business up to January 1st, 1900.

SURPLUS.—After making provision for all liabilities the surplus on our own standard is \$7,272,973, being an increase of \$170,921.30 over 1903.

THE various reports having been adopted, the retiring directors, Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, A. Hoar, Esq., K. C., Hon. Mr. Justice Garrow and E. P. Clement, Esq., K. C., were members of the Board, prominent Policy holders, the Managers, the agents and others, the meeting adjourned.

The Directors met subsequently and re-elected Mr. Robert Melvin President; Mr. Alfred Hoar, K. C., First Vice President; and the Hon. Mr. Justice Britton, Second Vice President of the Company for the ensuing year.
