cates annexed, amounting to £45 5, and for which he has never received any compensation, and praying payment of his account, and thereupon, it was moved that the said petition be referred to a Committee to examine into the merits of the same and report thereon to the House, which being seconded and put, and the House dividing thereon, there appeared for the motion sisteen, against it seven, so it passed in the affirmative, and thereupon,

Ordered, That Mr. Millidge, Mr. Pyke, Mr. Wollenhaupt, Mr. Chipman and

Mr. Allison be a Committee for the above purpose.

A message from the Council by Mr. Gautier, Mr. Speaker,

The Council have agreed to the resolve in favor of Michael Wallace, the resolve in favor of Forsyth, Smith and Co. the resolve in favor of Elias Wheelock, and also the resolve in favor of John Woodin, junr.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the further consideration of the reports of the Committee respecting the several sums required for Roads, &c.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, Mr. Morris took the Chair, Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had made further progress in the business to them referred, and that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again on the consideration of the same, which report the House agreed to.

Mr. Tonge reported from the Committee appointed to devise means for retaining in this Province the Horses imported by his Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's

Table, where it was read and is as follows:

That the Committee having conferred with Mr. Campbell the proprietor of those Horses, they find that Gentleman is ready to bind himself that the said Horses shall remain in this Province, as covering Horses, as long as they shall live, and that he will as long as they continue in his possession, send them to those parts of the country where they may be most in demand on receiving a compensation for the advantage he might receive by exporting them to the United States where Horses of that quality are in high demand, and that Mr. Campbell estimates this compensation at the sum of sive hundred pounds.

Ordered, That the report do lie on the table to be perused by the Members of the House.

Mr. Dimock, pursuant to leave given, presented a petition of David Whidden and others, inhabitants of the County of Hants, residing near the river Shuben-accadie, and the same was read, setting forth, that the Petitioners and the public in general suffer great inconveniencies for want of a Road leading upon the West side of said river, from the Ferry, to communicate with the main road leading to Halisax from the District of Colchester; and praying the aid of the House.

Ordered, That the said Perition and also the petition of Joshua Sandford and others be referred to the Committee of the whole House, on the subject of Roads, &c.

Then the House adjourned 'till To-morrow at Eleven of the clock.
