REV. C. W. ROSE IS CHOSEN MODERATOR

Baptist Close Their Convention at Springfield—Splendid Addresses

(Special to Courier)

SPRINGFIELD, June 13.—In this morning's session of the Oxford-Brant Association of Baptist churches meeting here, Rev. C. W. Rose, B. D., of Park Church, Brantford, was elected moderator of the association for the coming year. He will be supported by Principal A. T. MacNeill, B.A., of Woodstock College, vice-moderator; Rev. T. E. Richards, B.A., of Riverdale church, Brantford; secretary-treasurer; Rev. Jas. Chalmers, of Shewstone Memorial church, assistant sec.-treasurer.

The first address of the morning was on Grand Ligne mission, by Rev. J. T. Priest, B.A., Jerseyville. In a very interesting way he set forth the problem that this mission has to face and its success in meeting it, telling the story of how for three quarters of a century Grande Ligne mission has been meeting pre-judice with life, love and logic. Last year the mission distributed through its colporteurs, 1387 copies or portions of the bible, and 35738 religious tracts and pamphlets, mainly by house to house visitation, nearly 8000 visits being made in the year. There were baptisms in the mission in the proportion of one to twelve of the membership. The work of the college, Feller Institute, in connection with the mission was given special notice; the especially encouraging feature of its work being that 50 students of the college were converted last year.

A discussion on social service followed, led by Rev. A. Atkins, Burdettville. Mr. Atkins described social service as both a spiritual and a living thing, and appealed for the practical support of the churches in it. A number took part in the discussion in which Rev. E. S. Grigg, B.A., superintendent of social service, answered questions from the delegates. The relation of social service to the church was followed, and it transpired that the men had come across the border illicitly and gone to Stratford with the circus. From there they left for Berlin and had not been in that town fifteen minutes when they were arrested. They were brought before the magistrate and fined \$75 and costs each for breaking immigration laws. They got in touch with a Toledo woman, who paid the fines, and there is some idea that Whitney may be the man Mitchell arrested in Brantford yesterday.
