Fresh Casualties Reported

From the Port

Simcoe, May 9th.—From our own

correspondent.—The seventh annual

meeting of the Rural Deanery of

Norfolk, was held here yesterday

forenoon, all the clergy of the Deane-

ry being present. The usual pro-

cedure was observed and Rev. H. J.

Johnson, of Port Dover, was nomi-

nated Rural Dean for the ensuing

year unanimously.

The seventh annual meeting of

the Sunday School Association of

the Rural Deanery of Norfolk, was

held this afternoon in Canon Hicks' men-

torial hall, owing to the slight in-

disposition of the President, Rev.

from the parish, where the next

meeting is to be held, and upon mo-

tion, Delhi was chosen for 1918.

All the clergymen of the Deane-

ry were present, also for the S.S. con-

vention.

There was a good representation

of laity also from Pt. Dover, Port

Rowan, Delhi, Vittoria, Waterford,

St. John's and Simcoe.
