Brockville circuit.—The county town of the united counties of Leeds and Grenville, is situated on the river St. Lawrence in the township of Elizabethtown, Ontario. It is distant from Perth 55 miles, Montreal 125 miles, Kingston 48 miles, and from Toronto 208 miles. It was founded in the year 1828. It was formerly part of Augusta circuit. The first minister was David Wright (no report published), then Esmer Healy and John C. Davidson with report of membership of 625.

THE UNITED CHURCH

"The Methodist church of Canada had made wonderful strides. Entering the union in 1884 with over 1,200 ministers and 128,642 members, when the various sections of Methodists came together to adopt the constitution and the discipline, and set in motion the machinery of the united church, there were 1,643 ministers, 109,808 members, 3,159 churches, and a total of church property exceeding \$9,000,000.00. The last few years have been years of rapid development and lofty achievements. The true spiritual life of the church has been intensified.

In those several years the increase in membership has been upwards of 64,000 or 38 per cent.

The mission-ry society has an annual income of nearly \$250,000. Schools and colleges have been enlarged and improved. The publishing interest has grown to gigantic proportions. Churches have been increased and beautified. Two additional conferences have been organized. The Sunday school work is expanding, and of the Protestant schools in the Dominion, more than one half the teachers are Methodist teachers. The Methodist adherents, according to the census, number 1,000,000, being one fifth the entire population of Canada."

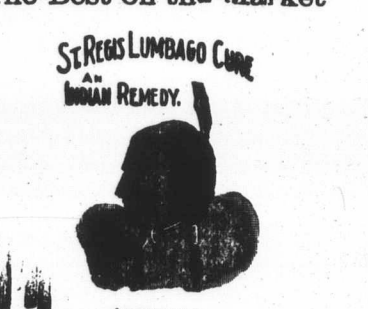
