

### TO DESTROY LICE

It is Essential to Kill the Young Ones as They Appear.
Farmers who do not give any attention to fowls in summer, permitting them to roost inside or outside of the poultry house, sometimes find their flocks in a condition in which many are sick or droopy without any appar-ent cause, and they pronounce the dis-ease cholera, proceeding to give rem-edles therefor when the cause is real-

Not only will the poultry house be swarming with lice but also the fences, woodpiles, trees, or wherever the hens may roost, and it is useless to attempt to get rid of lice on the hens as long as the vermin have pos-session of every location where the ens roost at night. Not only during



the day but through the entire night the hens are annoyed by the vermin, until they become exhausted and begin to droop, finally commencing to die off.

The use of remedies should be with the view of removing the difficulty at all cost. First, the poultry houses should be cleaned and the fowls made to roost therein, and not outside. Then the interior and exterior should be thoroughly drenched with sene emulsion, adding a gill of crude carbolic acid to every quart of the emulsion before adding the water. The oint is to do the work so as to save labor afterward. To destroy some of the lice and allow the rest to multiply is to waste time and labor. Besides there are eggs of lice hatching every hour, and it is essential to kill the young ones as fast as they appear.

CARELESS WITH DYNAMITE

from Who Bandle High Explosives For A party of gentlemen stood in one of

the hotel lobbies the other evening discussing general topics of everyday interest, and in the course of the con-sersation the subject of high explosives came up. One of them said it seemed one of the most astonishing of facts that a man who is engaged in the handling or manufacture of such high and dangerous explosives is so thoroughly oblivious of the imminent danger that is always present where nitro-glycerine, gun cotton, dynamite, or any easily exploded substance is being handled. in the party of gentlemen was the Hon. Samuel J. Ritchie, of Akron, Ohio, one of the best known capitalists in his own State, and a man whose experiences would fill a set of volumes. A discoverer of copper, a constructor and promoter of railroads, and as a mining expert with few equals, but most prominently connected with the various movements that have started from time to time relative to the annexation of Canada, Ritchie's reminiscences turned on his any narrow escapes from high explosives and the careless and reckless manner in which they were handled by men who seemed indifferent to the possibility of their momentary anni-

"I remember one occasion out in my State," said Mr. Ritchie, "when I sat for over thirty-five miles in close proximity to a couple of cans of nitro-glycerine that stood in the most dangerous way near a railroad car stove, and might have at any moment blown the train and passengers to kingdo come. I boarded the train at a little station along the line, and, noticing a man whom I knew in the fore end of the smoker, I took a seat beside him and began a spirited conversation about some then important matter. I noticed these cans standing near but didn't suppose they were anything but molasses, or, possibly, 'bugeye,' he taking to the boys up the line. After a while, in a jocose way, I said: Bill, what have you got in those cans;

liquor?"
"'It's the strongest liquor I know of,' he replied; 'it's nitro-glycerine I'm taking up for some work to be done in tunnelling."
"I didn't lose any time getting away

from the vicinity, I tell you, and in a little while the passengers found out what was on board. The man was put off as soon as possible, and we all breathed freer, I tell you. Any moment during that thirty-odd mile ride might have been our last, and yet that fellow sat there smoking and chatting as gayly as though he were having the of fun. powerful mixtures had eliminated all fear of their danger.

"Another time," continued the speaker, "I had occasion during my experience in railroad quastruction to enter into negotiations with a man for the purchase of three or four tons of dynamite. He had been doing some blasting, and his work being finished, and I being anxious to get the explo-sive for some tunnelling that was ne-cessary, I bought it from him. The town where I was, being one of those small Western settlements, there was an apology for a hotel, where I put up. The deal took me three or four days, and when I had about settled it I casually inquired where I would find the caps that were to go with the lot of dynamite I had just purchased. "'Oh,' said the man, 'the caps are

under your bed at the hotel. I thought it the safest place to put them, and I really had almost forgotten them. Glad you mentioned them.' Would you be-lieve it," said Mr. Ritchie," "I had been sleeping on a bed under which were enough explosives to blow the hotel into atoms. Just suppose a slat had given way or some other casualty had occurred—why, I'd have gone to glory quicker than I'm telling you people, and I didn't sleep there that night you can rest assured, and I put some miles that day between your humble servant and those caps and dynamita."
