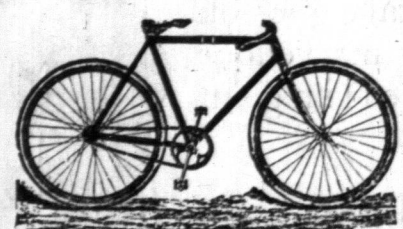

HOW TO BE HANDSOME

British Grip on Commerce.

There seems to be no question as to the great preponderance of the trade of Great Britain, when compared with other European countries. According to recently published statistics prepared by the English Chamber of Commerce, England sends 37 per cent. of all Great Britain's exports, as compared with 10 per cent. sent by France and 2 per cent. by Germany. To China she sends 21 per cent. of the imports of that country, while France and Germany send comparatively nothing. To Japan Great Britain sends 34 per cent. of its total imports, against 8 per cent. sent by Germany and 5 per cent. sent by France. The trade with British colonial or other possessions is simply overwhelming, but this is what might be expected. To British India she contributes no less than 70 per cent. of its total imports, to Australia 43 per cent. and to other British possessions in about the same proportion. Although German trade in the same directions has increased, it remains, comparatively unimportant. There seems to be no lessening of the hold of Great Britain upon the commerce world.—Troy Press.

Non-Magnetic Watches.

The English Admiralty has been making some interesting experiments on the effect of powerful magnetic fields upon the going rate of non-magnetic watches. The watches were placed within a quarter of an inch of the pole of a dynamo generating a heavy current, which was a stray field, the influence of which was perceptible 70 feet off. The watches were kept in this position for ten days, at the end of which, curiously enough, they kept better time than when under normal influence. All through the ten days there was never a greater daily error than one second, and on four days the variation was so small that it could not be determined. The daily error of the same watch, during six days under ordinary conditions, was never less than half a second, and at one time went as high as four seconds. The watches of different makes were tried and the results were practically the same.

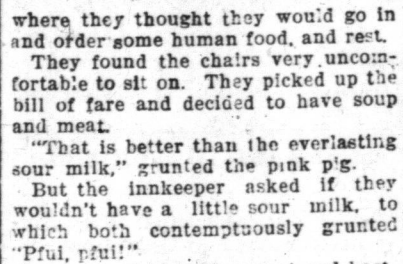

"Look at those feet!"

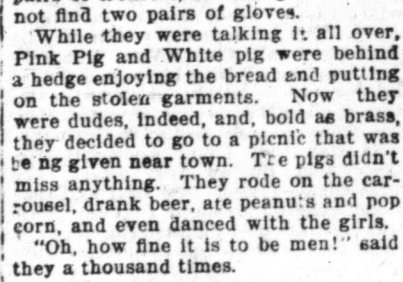
The pigs had to try down by the road to rest, White Pig said:

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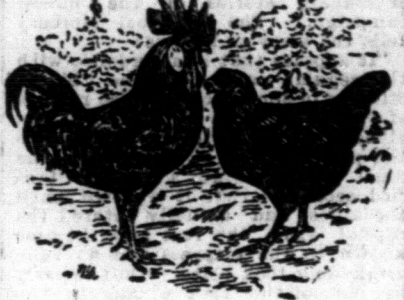

TO DESTROY LICE

It is Essential to Kill the Young Ones as They Appear.

Farmers who do not give any attention to fowls in summer, permitting them to roost inside or outside of the poultry house, sometimes find their flocks in a condition in which many are sick or droopy without any apparent cause, and they pronounce the disease cholera, proceeding to give remedies therefor when the cause is really lice.

Not only will the poultry house be swarming with lice but also the fences, woodpiles, trees, or wherever the hens may roost, and it is useless to attempt to get rid of lice on the hens as long as the vermin have possession of every location where the hens roost at night. Not only during



the day but through the entire night the hens are annoyed by the vermin, until they become exhausted and begin to droop, finally commencing to die off.

The use of remedies should be with the view of removing the difficulty at all cost. First, the poultry houses should be cleaned and the fowls made to roost therein, and not outside. Then the interior and exterior should be thoroughly drenched with kerosene emulsion, adding a gill of crude carbolic acid to every quart of the emulsion before dipping the water. CARELESS WITH DYNAMITE

A party of gentlemen stood in one of the long lobbies the other evening discussing general topics of everyday conversation, and in the course of the conversation the subject of high explosives came up. One of them said it seemed one of the most astonishing facts that a man who is engaged in the handling or manufacture of such thoroughly dangerous explosives is so thoroughly oblivious of the imminent danger that is always present where nitro-glycerine, gun cotton, dynamite, or any easily exploded substance is being handled, in the party of gentlemen was the Hon. Samuel J. Ritchie, of Akron, Ohio, one of the best known capitalists in his own State, and a man whose experience had begun a set of volumes. A discoverer of copper, a constructor and promoter of railroads, and as a mining expert with few equals, but most prominently connected with the vast movement that have been started from time to time relative to the annexation of Canada, Mr. Ritchie's reminiscences turned on his many narrow escapes from high explosives and the careless and reckless manner in which they were handled by men who seemed indifferent to the possibility of their momentary annihilation.

I remember one occasion on in my State," said Mr. Ritchie, "when I sat for over thirty-five miles in close proximity to a couple of cans of nitro-glycerine that stood in the most dangerous way near a railroad car stove, and might have at any moment blown the train and passengers to kingdom come. I boarded the train at a little station along the line, and, noticing a man whom I knew in the fore end of the smoker, I took a seat beside him and began a spirited conversation about some then important matter. I noticed these cans standing near us, but didn't suppose they were anything but molasses, or possibly, 'bugery,' he was talking to the boys and the men after a while, in a loose way, I said: 'Bill, what have you got in those cans; liquor?'

"It's the strongest liquor I know of," he replied; "it's nitro-glycerine I'm taking up for some work to be done in tunnelling."

"I didn't lose any time getting away from the vicinity, I tell you, and in a little while the passengers found out what was on board. The man was put off as soon as possible, and we all breathed freer, I tell you. Any moment during that thirty-odd mile ride might have been our last, and yet that fellow sat there smoking and chatting away as though he were having the best of fun. I know he didn't think of it, for long acquaintance with such powerful mixtures had eliminated all fear of their danger."

"Another time," continued the speaker, "I had occasion during my experience in railroad construction to enter into negotiations with a man for the purchase of three or four tons of dynamite. He had been doing some blasting, and his work was finished, and I being anxious to get the explosive for some tunnelling that was necessary, I bought it from him. The town where I was, being one of those small Western settlements, there was no hotel, so I had a room put up. The deal took me three or four days, and when I had about settled it I casually inquired where I would find the caps that were to go with the lot of dynamite I had just purchased."

"Oh," said the man, the caps are under your bed at the hotel. I thought it the safest place to put them, and I really had almost forgotten them. Glad you mentioned them. Would you be here?" said Mr. Ritchie. "I had been sleeping on a bed under which were enough explosives to blow the hotel into atoms. Just suppose a slat had given way or some other casualty had occurred—why, I'd have gone to glory quicker than I'm telling you people, and I didn't sleep there that night you can rest assured, and I put some miles that day between your humble servant and those caps and dynamite."
