James Creelman, journalist and author, was born at Montreal, Canada, Nov. 12, 1859. He was educated in the public schools and Talmage's Lay Theological College. He was in the service of The New York Herald as a reporter, correspondent and editorial writer 1837-89, editor of The London edition, 1890, and of the Paris edition, 1891-2. Mr. Creelman then became editor of The New York Evening Telegram, which position he held until the close of 1893, when he became British editor of The Cosmpolitan Magazine. He was war correspondent for The New York World during the Russian-Japanese war and served other leading publications during the Graeco-Turkish war, the Cuban and Philippine wars. He captured a Spanish flag and was shot and almost mortally wounded in 1852. After he received the surreader of the Spanish Commandant at Hi Caney, Cuba, he had charge of the editorial page, and was later Washington correspondent for The New York Journal. His books include.
