GRAND DUKE REPORTED DEAD

Rumor Comes from St. Petersburg and Cannot Be Confirmed—Injuries Admitted Serious.

Russian Authorities Cling to Original Theory as to Sinking of Petropavlovsk-Emperor Fled.

(Special to The Planet.)

St. Petersburg, April 15-3.15 p. Persistent rumors are circulating that Grand Duke Cyril is dead, but the correspondent of the Associated Press cannot secure any confirmation. On the contrary, Lieut.-Gen. Prince Gallitzin, master of the Grand Duke Vladimir's household, is the Associ atedated Press' authority for the statement that the telegram received this morning reported the condition of the Grand Duke Cyril as being better. The naval staff has no information

confirming last night's rumor that the Japanese have succeeded in blocking the entrance of the harbor of Port Arthur.

The wife of Capt. Jakovieff, commander of the Russian battleship Petropavlovsk, who was on the bridge with the Grand Duke at the time of the catastrophe, has received a telegram from Rear-Admiral Grigoro vitch, commandant at Port Arthur, saying that her husband is wounded in the head and that several of his ribs are broken. He was unconscious until yesterday, but is improving.

The admiralty authorizes the As sociated Press to deny Vice-Admiral Togo's claim that the Japanese sank the Petropavlovsk in a fight off Port Arthur. The officials declare positively that there was no maval engagement, excepting the torpedo boat destroyer fight, either preceding or following the loss of the flagship. Russia has formally acceded to

Japan's request, made through the United States, to allow 600 Japanese refugees and the Japanese consular staff of the island of Sakhalien to return to Japan. They will be taken off in a neutral ship which be arranged for by the Washington authori

London April 15, 2.05 p, m - A special despatch from Paris received here to-day announces that the imperial palace at Seoul, Korea, has been destroyed by fire and that the emperor has fled. Paris, April 15, 1.10 p. m.-A cable

report received at the foreign office here says that the imperial palace at Seoul, Korea, was complete ly destroyed by fire last night. The fire began in the evening and lasted throughout the night. Only the ruins of the palace remain. The emperor and his suite succeeded in escaping to a near-by refuge. The report does not mention any loss of life, nor does it give the cause of the fire, but the recent political unrest in the Korean capital leads to fears that the destruction of the palace was the work of the rebellious

Cleaning Furs. Furs dark in color may be cleaned first by brushing them well with a switch, after hanging over a line, then by rubbing well heated cedar or mahogany sawdust into the fur and brushing out again. The best way to remove the same after the cleaning is done is to put the fur side down on until all dust is removed.

If the furs are soiled at neck or wrists, they may be cleaned with gasoline-of course in a room or outdoors. where no fire is.

White furs may be cleaned with hot cornmeal (white), the same being rubbed into the fur as described above for the dark furs with sawdust. Both the dark and white furs should be hung outdoors in a shady place after clean

Magnesia may also be used for cleaning light colored or white furs. It should be used in cakes and the cake rubbed upon the fur.

Rice Mold With Maple Sugar.

Wash well one cupful of rice, drop into boiling salted water and keep at a galloping boil until the grains are tender all through. This will take about cording to the variety of rice. Drain cording to the variety of rice. Drain, place in a saucepan with one-half of a cupful of milk and one-quarter of a cupful of cream and cook very slowly until the liquid is absorbed. Have ready a buttered mold. Fill this with the rice, tapping it sharply from time to time that the rice may settle well. Stand in the open oven for five min-utes, then turn out on a heated dish. Serve with an abundance of good but-ter and scraped maple sugar. This is an old New England dish and a very good one, says Table Talk.
