PRISON FOR DOWIEITE

Toronto Leader Who Aided in Fatal Neglect Sentenced.

Six Months Hard Labor In Central Prison For Rev. Eugene Brooks-Husband of the Woman Who Died Gets a Year-Judge McCrimmon, Senior Judge of Ontario County, Scathingly Addresses Prisoner.

Whitby, Jan. 9.—Rev. Eugene Brooks, a Dowleite leader at Toronto, and Dowle's representative in Canada, was yesterday sentenced by Judge Mo-Crimmon, senior judge of the County of

Ontario, senior Juage of the County of Ontario, to six months with hard kebor in the Central Prison, Toronto.

The charge against the prisoner was of "aiding, councilling and abetting one Marshall Harmon of Victoria Corners, Township of Brock, in neglect in securing medical assistance during his wife's last illness."

Harmon's wife died early last sum-mer, her illness being a severe case of dropsy, which developed one week afer confinement. The husband was faith cure believer, and refused to allow neighbors who wished to render assistance, entrance to the house.

He sent to Teronto for High Apostte Brooks, and met him at Uxbridge Sta-

tion, ten miles distant from the Har-mon house. During his trip to the sta-tion to meet the eider, his wife was left alone at home helpiess with an In-fant seven days old. Brooks remained with the woman for a few hours, and prayed with the patient. The hurkand prayed with the patient. The husband then drove him back to the station leaving the poor wife alone a second

Dectors Too Late. During the husband's second absence Mrs. Harmon's brother and sister ac-cidentally came to see her, and when they discovered her condition they im-mediately sent for medical assistance. The woman sank rapidly, however, and was dead in a couple of days.

Tocal feeling ran very high, and Harmon was arrosted and brought to Whitby jail. He was sentenced a week ago by Judge McCrimmon to one year with hard labor in the Central Prison. Yesterday Elder Brooks was asked by the judge if he had anything to say and he took advantage of the judge's offer to deliver a half an hours har-angue, quoting Scripture in support of his belief. He admitted that he had

told Mrs. Harmon and her husband that if they depended on the arm of flesh for a cure they could not expect assistance from the almighty. Had His Doubts. His honor here interrupted the prisoner with the remark that he say

prisoner with the remark that he saw that he had supplied himself with a counsel in flesh in the person of Wm. E. Sinclair, barrister of Oshawa. The prisoner laughed, and admitted he wasn't altogether relying on divine aid in this trial.

Brooks is a southerner, and, it is said, has served before terms in prison for similar offences.

FORESTRY PROGRESS.

Two Extensive Additions Made to Permanent Forest Reserves. The annual report of the Bureau of Forestry is being circulated by the clerks of the Attorney-General's De-

partment. The report, in reference to forestry progress in Ontario, say the fire rang-ing system on public lands under li-cense continues to be an increasingly useful institution in the protection of

useful institution in the protection of standing timber, in which both the lumbermen and the province have a direct and large financial interests.

The number of rangers applied for by lumbermen has been greater than ever before. This is taken to indicate an appreciation of the value of the service to the lumbering interests.

During the past senson the department has organized a fire protection service for the protection of lands along the Temiskaming Railway, the building of which through a practicalbuilding of which through a practically unbroken forest presented unusual dangers. The expense of the service, e most efficient, was borne jointly by the department and the Railway Commission. A feature of this service was the use of railway velocipedes by the rangers, enabling them during dry seasons to follow up

trains and extinguish at once any incipient fires. Two extensive additions have been made to the permanent forest reserves, amounting in all to 5,700 square miles, or 4,288,000 acres, and known respectively as the Westerw Temagami reserve and the Mississaga

A number of pictures of timber lots in Norfolk. Huron and Brant coun-ties accompany the report, showing the possibilities of reforestration.

Fig Trees Grow on Vancouver It will be news to many horticulturists to learn that fig trees are to be found growing wild on Vancouver Island.

Some little time ago Mr. Parker Williams, M. P. P., sent some leaves to Mr. J. R. Anderson, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, for identification, says The Vancouver World. The, trees from which they were obtained, Mr. Williams said, were about two miles apart and seemed to be seedlings of figs. The trees were described as being about six feet in height and making a vigorous growth. After examining the leaves the Deputy Minister replied to Mr. Williams giving his opinion that the specimens certainly resembled the Smyrna fig, and believed it to be of that variety. The fig, whilst it does well and produces good fruit in this province, is not indigenous.

Mr. Anderson referred the specimens to Dr. Fletcher of Ottawa, who coincided with the Deputy Minister as to the variety, and said:

"It is remarkable that these fig trees should have established themselves in British Columbia, but I suppose if the tree would stand the winter, there is no reason why they should not be introduced, because firs, as put up for

no reason why they should not be in troduced, because figs, as put up fo market, are not treated with heat, s I believe the seeds would grow."
