School of Horticulture.
After a well earned vacation of some weeks, Prof. Faville has again resumed his duties as principal of the N. S. School of Horticulture. The classes met for the first time last Thursday. There are three classes with a total enrollment of sixty students. This number will be largely augmented the first of December. Two classes are beginning the work, and the other, consisting of last year's students, are taking the advanced work. Prof. Faville, the popular and efficient instructor, with his genuine western energy and push, has personally superintended the purchase of the new apparatus for the use of the school, and in consequence the appliances for the successful prosecution of the work are far in advance of those in use last year. Beside two new and extremely powerful microscopes, the school possesses Library, Museum, Laboratory, Greenhouse and Workshop, in course of construction.
At the opening session there were present, J. W. Bigelow, Pres. of F. G. A., W. C. Archibald and C. R. H. Starr, Chairman and Secretary of Executive Committee, Prof. Godfrey, principal of the High School, beside a number of last year's students and staunch friends of the school.
Since the first inception of the institution a series of obstacles and obstructions have been met and overcome, largely by the untiring energy of Prof. Faville, ably assisted by the practical business talents of J. W. Bigelow, Esq., Pres. of the F. G. A., to whose prudence and sagacity the fruit growers of this Province, as well as the Association over which he so ably presides, are largely indebted.
The present outlook for the School of Horticulture is brighter than even the most sanguine friends of the Institution had dared to hope for. Among the most promising features is the fact that twenty-five students from the High School are enrolled; fifteen in the first year's course, and ten taking the second year's work. For this encouraging state of things the Institution is largely indebted to the efforts of the liberal minded and progressive principal of the High School, Prof. Godfrey, who, though not a horticulturist himself, is a native of this town, and probably imbibed his love for the profession from his environments in early youth.
