LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

—Moncton has put up 100 new buildings this year.

—A good hay sells for \$9 per ton at St. John.

—There is at least twenty bar-room open all day Sunday in St. John.

—It is reported from Russian sources that a complete state of anarchy prevails in Afghanistan.

—The Mexican town of Quibdo is stated to have been swallowed up by an earthquake on 18th September.

—Mr. Gibson is sending his men into the woods on the headwater of the Nashua river. They number over 500.

—More than 20,000 pairs of partridges have been shipped from St. John to Boston and New York during the present season.

—The Spanish Government have been informed of the departure from the United States of a filibustering expedition for Cuba.

—An unknown schooner, about 120 tons, is sunk a few miles below Bear's Head, N. B. The crew is supposed to be lost.

—Mr. W. H. Rogers, Fishery Inspector, of Amherst, has been awarded a silver medal by the Hon. the Secretary of the Fisheries, for his patent salmon ladder.

—Mr. George Robertson, only surviving son of the late Collector of Customs, James Robertson, died at his mother's residence, Sunday, Oct. 27.

—Rev. Canon DeVeber, of St. John, has recently been in communication with Rev. Mr. Hoadley, of Moncton, and Mr. Campbell, of Dorchester, in reference to the whereabouts of a lad named Danvers, who left home in St. John about the last of July past. He was last seen in the Dorchester penitentiary about first of August.

—The New York "World's" London cable letter says: "The conflict between the priests and physicians throughout Portugal in regard to cremation has been settled; the authorities of all the principal municipalities have issued decrees making cremation optional in all cases, and compelling the burial of those who die in districts in which diseases of the nature of plague have been declared epidemic."

AMHERST.

—The supper by the band was a grand success. Gross amount, \$255.

—Trade in brick, merchants are beginning to display their most attractive goods.

—Mr. D. Skimming, a veteran Minuteman, died a few days ago, and his funeral on Monday was one of the largest ever seen in Amherst.

—Canon Townshend sailed on Monday for England. Previous to his departure from the parish he was presented by the church-wardens with a handsome silver addition and pursued an earnest of their good wishes, and a slight token of their respect and esteem.

—The output of copper in one of legal construction of a contract merely. The debate—"Which is the best adapted to the interests of Canada, a Protective or Free Trade Policy?" was well brought before the public by the speaker and respondent, who were both ably sustained. No political allusion interfered with the harmony of the debate, and each speaker evidently tried to get at the root of the matter, irrespective of party bias. Below will be found a resume of the arguments on either side. On the side of a Protective Policy Mr. A. R. Dickey showed the importance of the question to us as a part of the Dominion, that it was of great interest to the whole world, and that the Dominion of Canada had been precipitated the Southern Rebellion, had overturned one powerful government, and given the rule to another. He begged both sides not to push their arguments to the extreme on either side, revenue must be raised by indirect taxation, and the root question was, what principle should guide us in this, a Free Trade or Protective one? As a theory, he granted that that of Free Trade was a perfect one, but protection was not a theory but expediency. Imposition of duties will foster manufactures. Showed that Adam Smith, the father of Free Trade principles, could not, by his disciples, by every means in his power, had enforced and spread these principles. And yet, after fifty years, only two countries in the world had put this theory into practice. The United States and France, emerging from severe contests and burdened with debt, had adopted the opposite policy with happy results. Germany, while burdened by neither, had declined under a Free Trade policy. England has flourished, but in her case the removal of duties meant the removal of a practical grievance, viz: that duties on the raw materials she was not adapted to produce a surplus—besides, England had no great rival in commerce. FATAL ACCIDENT.—An accident occurred at Chignecto Mines last week by which two boys were injured, one fatally. A loaded box of coal on which the boys were riding was thrown down a balance shaft, a distance of forty feet or more, and one of the boys was killed. The other boy, Daniel Lockhart, aged sixteen, received injuries to the head which caused his death next morning, as well as fracture of the bones of the leg and other injuries. The boys were disobeying orders in riding on the car, and consequently no blame could be attached to the management. The coroner's jury found a verdict in accordance with the above facts. A report was published that the boy died while under the influence of chloroform; this is perniciously untrue; a small quantity was necessary to set the fractured bone, the influence of which passed off, and he died eleven hours after from compression of the brain from intracranial hemorrhage. D. C. Allen, Esq., M. D., acted as coroner.
