Can't Be Smelled and May Not Be Felt for Hours, Declares Herbert Corey—Attacks the Mucous Membrane and Proves Deadly to the Victim.

American Field Headquarters, Oct. 15.—(By Mail).—Fritz has a new gas. It is a bit more devilish than any of its predecessors because it is more insidious.

Gas masks are small protection against it, because it penetrates the clothing and sets up an irritation in any spot in which the skin has been rubbed or broken. Then it spreads.

This is the third new gas to be discovered in four months. By the time the Americans get into the field this may have almost become a "gas war."

Persons given over to forebodings visualize troops fighting in the front trenches clothed like deep-sea divers, in suits that cannot be penetrated by the new devilness.

The new gas is delivered either from hose, in the old fashion, or from bursting shells in the new. It cannot be detected by the sense of smell, and often an hour or more passes before the occupants discover they have been "gassed."

The subsequent treatment is rendered more difficult by the fact that the methods which experience has shown are best adapted to the asphyxiating gas are positively dangerous with the "sulfure d'ethylene dichlore," which is the new form. Yet it is often difficult to distinguish between the sufferers from the two forms. With the ingenuity that distinguishes them, the Germans use both gases in the same sector.

The new gas directly attacks the mucous membranes. "In the euphoric we are often able to peel off the mucous membrane as one would an old glove," said one surgeon. "Sometimes it breaks and curls up like the shingles on an old roof."

The gas clings to the clothing, so that subsequent wearers may be attacked if it is not thoroughly cleaned. The nature of the new weapon may be indicated by some of the directions given to army surgeons for treating those injured by it.

"Strip them at once if possible and bathe in a solution of soapy water. This should be done at the dressing station, if possible."

It is then directed that they shall be sent at once to a hospital by a special ambulance, and be given precedence of other wounded. The stretchers should be covered with waxed cloth which can easily be cleaned. Surgeons and nurses handling the patients must wear impenetrable gloves. They must be kept separate from other patients.

The clothing taken from them must be kept in a sealed receptacle, or at a safe distance from possible human contact until there is opportunity to clean it thoroughly. Various forms of treatment are prescribed, but all agree that the sort are urged to keep a close watch upon them and notify medical headquarters at once of new phenomena produced.

Laurier Liberals Seeking Election Under Subterfuge

Beware of Bogus Win-the-War Candidates Who Swear Allegiance to a Leader Whose Policy is Bound to Lose-the-War—Not to Be Trusted.

(From a Toronto paper):

To Canadian Soldiers, Overseas: Well, boys, by the time you receive this, you will be preparing to cast your vote in the most important election that has yet taken place in the history of Canada. We have no doubt that you will vote the right way, but many traps are being set by the Laurier Sick-of-the-War or Lose-the-War candidates, to catch your votes, that we think it well to warn you of the danger.

As you know, a Union-Victory Government has been formed under Sir Borden. This Government includes prominent Liberals, such as Sifton of Alberta, Calder of Saskatchewan, Crerar of Manitoba, Rowell and Hugg of Ontario, Balfour of Quebec, Beebe, Carvell of New Brunswick, A. K. Maclean of Nova Scotia, and well known Conservative ministers such as Borden, Meigher, Blonadin, Crothers, etc. The object of this Union Government is to still more vigorously prosecute the war by enforcing the Selective Draft, rounding up the slackers and the shirkers, checking the robberies of the food profiteers, and by abolishing that curse in peace as well as war times—political patronage.

Those Liberals who have joined the Union Government have broken with their former leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who is opposed to Selective Draft because his native province of Quebec is against it to a man. For the same reason he is opposed to the Union Government, and is striving (fortunately in vain in many cases) to prevent Liberals from severing their allegiance to him. He is now to be seen at the Old Coque with the White Plume as quite a number of supporters of his traitorous policy, outside of the disgraced province of Quebec, but with the aid of the soldiers' vote, the vote of their female kin, and the disfranchisement of alien enemies who have been naturalized in Canada since 1912, the Win-the-War Union Government hopes to show Laurier and his following in Quebec that the lives of Canadian soldiers lost in Flanders will not be sacrificed in vain, and that Quebec, the tail-end of Canada, has wagged the Canadian dog for the last time.

Take it from us that the return of Laurier to power would mean the end of Canada's active participation in the war. Quebec with its 65 seats in the Dominion House will vote solidly for Laurier and against the Selective Draft. It is up to you, Canada's brave and loyal sons, to counteract the effect of that by plumping for the Union Government the men who have pledged their oath that they will not desert you the men who realize the necessity of destroying Prussian militarism for all time, the men, who, in contradistinction of Laurier and Laurier Liberals, have sacrificed their country and the gallant lads who have so gloriously upheld the honor of Canada and shed glory on its name.

You will have to beware of those candidates who pose as Win-the-War candidates and who at the same time voice their allegiance to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Two things are incompatible. Man cannot serve God and Mammon. No one can be a Win-the-War candidate if he supports Sir Wilfrid Laurier in opposition to Borden's Union Government. No one can sleep with Laurier and eat with the Union Government. Some Laurier Liberals have already discovered this fact. At first they boldly pronounced themselves Laurier Liberals, but since they have become conscious of the feeling in the country outside of Quebec, they are not advertising their connection with the Old Coque. Some of them now say that they are also Win-the-War candidates, or independent candidates. Don't believe them. They would have no more compunctions in betraying you than they had in attempting to betray you during the passage of the Military Service Act. Their effort now is to get returned to Parliament under a subterfuge, and on reaching there, they would buck the efforts of the Union Government as they desperately tried

to prevent the late Conservative Government from putting any vigor into their prosecution of the war. Nemesis is on the trail of these pretenders, and it will be God help the man who is returned to Parliament to support the Union Government and to renounce principles which that government has endorsed, and who proves to be false to his pledge.

We think you can rely on the names of candidates that will be given you by the Government as supporters of the Win-the-War policy. Canada needs every vote that you can muster in support of these candidates, if Canada is not to be brought to the verge of revolution as a result of Laurier being returned to power at the head of a party which is opposed to Canada taking part in this great fight for freedom. Make every vote count. Vote for Union Government. Your women folks at home need your help now as much as you need their love, sympathy and prayers in the brave fight you are making for them. It is too bad that you should be bothered with this at a time when you are so busily engaged driving back the Hun, but you can also charge this up to Laurier and his chief henchman, George P. Graham, who were so hungry for power that they cared not what burdens they laid upon your shoulders, or what additional sacrifices they called upon you to make. See that you give them and all their tribe their "conge" give them what they have given the Huns on many a battlefield—give them hell, and vote for the Union Government.
