North'd County Council.
TUESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.
On motion constables' pay during this session of Council was fixed at \$1.00 per day.
The following C's were present in the afternoon in addition to those present when the roll was called—Loggie, Alwick; Burchill, Nelson; Robinson; Derby; Underhill, Blackville.
C1 Sullivan moved the appointment of Geo. Williston as Comm. of Roads, Middle District, Parish Hardwicke.
C1 R. B. Adams brought up the matter of the new road asked for in Chatham at last Jan's session and referred to the present July session. He moved, seconded by C1 Goggin, that the Parish of Chatham be assessed the amount required for land damages \$305. The road referred to is in the rear of the Canada House, connecting St. John Street and Foundry Lane, through lands of Mrs. Towley, and opposite what is considered quite a necessary thoroughfare, the matter having been thoroughly discussed at the Jan'y session. Assessment ordered.
C1 R. B. Adams presented petition of D. McGrath in reference to some interest due to him of a lot of land purchased by him in 1864 for which the sum of \$30 was paid. This amount had been paid but there was \$116 due for interest for which a note had been given, and the prayer of this petition was that for various reasons given the interest be remitted. Petition received. The Sec'y-Tr. explained that he had called upon the petitioner for am't of vote, and he had promised to let the matter lie over until this session. The cost of the lot was excessive as the petition explained, and the petitioner felt it was his duty that he was now required to pay \$116 for interest. He moved that the interest be remitted. The matter was referred to the Council for their consideration.
The following accounts were ordered to be paid as recommended by the com. Wm. Cottier, prisoners board \$79.60. There was an error of \$3.40 and com. recommend \$76.20. August Backley, com. Wm. Cottier, \$47.44. For oil and chloride of lime \$2.00, to be paid out of Chatham police fund balance \$45.44 by County. Wm. McIntosh, constables fees &c., \$24.10. Com. recom-

favor. On motion prayer of petition not granted.
C1 Burchill presented the petition of Johann Quigley, for payment of damages to produce &c., in her collar, in consequence of the stoppage of a public drain. Damage estimated at \$60, and she prays that an order be passed to pay her this amount. C1 Burchill moved that a Committee be appointed to investigate the matter and to report to-morrow. It was said that other petitions of the same kind were to come in and that they shall be referred to the same Committee. Com. were C's Burchill, A. Adams, Kenneth Cameron.
C1 A. Adams, Chairman of a Committee appointed at the January session to prepare a Bye Law in reference to the duties of District Clerks at Municipal elections presented their report which in substance was as follows:
It provides that in Parishes where there are two or more polling places it shall be the duty of the District Clerks, other than those of District No. 1, to provide a building for holding elections to be paid not more than \$2.00 for such building. Such District Clerks to receive the returns from the Chairmen of the electing wards and to return to the Chairman of District No. 1 before 10 a. m. of the day following the election, and to the duty of the District Clerks to provide ballot boxes when required, said boxes to cost not more than \$1.00 and to become the property of the Parish, and these ballot boxes shall be delivered to their successors in office; and the District Clerks other than No. 1, District shall be allowed for their services in any such election not exceeding the sum of \$2.00, which amount, together with rent of building and cost of ballot boxes if required shall be a Parish charge on the respective Parishes to which these provisions shall extend. Signed—A. Adams, R. B. Adams, James Robinson, Committee.
Report received and adopted.
C1 Burchill moved that a com. of five be appointed to examine any County accounts that may come before Council. C's Burchill, Goggin, Loggie, Tozer, Swin were appointed.
C1 Sullivan presented petition of James Nevelan for refund of assessment, he being taxed both in the Parish of Hardwicke and Chatham, and prays that an order be passed that the amount collected in Chatham be refunded to him, as he was legally entitled to pay in Hardwicke only. Pet. received and on motion prayer of pet. granted and Chatham ordered to refund the 90 cents collected. C1 adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 16.
C1 called to order by the Warden at 10 a. m. Minutes of yesterday's sitting read and approved.
Sec'y-Tr. presented petition of Amos Parley and 53 others of the lower district Parish Chatham against the bye law making dogs liable to a tax of \$1.00 in that district, and stating that the bye law passed at the January session, the petition for which was signed by only 13 persons, was not generally known until the said bye law was published in the local papers, and the petitioners pray for the reconsideration of said bye law, stating reasons why this bye law should not be continued in force. The petitioners do not blame the Chatham C's for their action but think they were deceived by misrepresentation of parties for selfish purposes. C's Sullivan, Ryan, McNaughton and others spoke to this matter, and in the absence of any Councillor from Chatham it was laid over until 2 o'clock.
C1 Sullivan moved that a com. of 3 be appointed to visit the jail and report at 3 p. m. He thought it better to make the inspection semi-annually instead of annually as heretofore. C's Ryan, Sullivan and Jardine were appointed. The Council adjourned until 12 o'clock for committee work.

C1 Burchill from com. on Accounts presented the following accounts which being certified to were ordered to be paid—J. R. Goggin, for locks Chatham Lock Up, \$1.80. Certified correct and ordered to be paid out of Chatham police fund. E. R. Ryan, Auditor, half year's salary \$37.50. John Shireff, High Sheriff, summoning juries &c., \$251.00. Samuel Thomson, Sec'y-Tr., filling school assessment lists \$51.50. J. E. Collins advertising, \$7.00. John Morrison, prisoners board \$78.30. Jos. Chapman, coroner, two inquests and constables' expenses \$29.50. Mullans & Ramsay, time for jail \$2.00. James Brown, jail supplies \$37.19. Samuel Thomson, expenses incurred in getting possession of land lately occupied by Mrs. Shaw, amount to be paid out of land fund. Donald Dixon, constable fees criminal prosecution \$6.00. John Morrissey, constable, serving subpoenas \$2.40. John S. Pond, mileage account this July session, 127 miles \$12.70. Kenneth Cameron, do., 130 miles \$13.00. Hugh Cameron, do., 38 miles \$3.80. Wm. McNaughton, do., 22 miles \$2.20. H. Swin, do., 96 miles \$9.60. Enoch Bamford, do., 90 miles \$9.00. Jared Tozer, do., 12 miles \$1.20. M1 Ryan, do., 38 miles \$3.80. A. Adams, do., 10 miles \$1.00. T. W. Underhill, do., 50 miles \$5.00. J. H. Jardine, do., 36 miles \$3.60. J. R. Goggin, do., 12 miles \$1.20. George Fawcett, do., 44 miles \$4.40. Jeremiah Sullivan, do., 90 miles \$9.00. Roman Savoy, do., 64 miles \$6.40. Robt. Loggie, do., 90 miles \$9.00. R. B. Adams, do., 8 miles \$0.80.

mend \$13.80 in full. Council adjourned for dinner.
AFTERNOON SESSION.
Licenses granted: Sarah Desmond, Newcastle, tavern, 6 mos.; Matthew Carroll, Chatham, tavern, 6 mos.
C1 Sullivan, from com. to report on state of jail recommended more ventilation in the cells and the putting in of air pipes over the water closets, new stoves and other recommendations. Also reported jail clean and in good order. Report received. C1 Goggin brought up the petition in reference to the bye law imposing a dog tax in lower district Parish Chatham. After discussion it was moved that it lie over until January session; which motion was carried.
