NEW OFFICERS WERE ELECTED.

Stormy Meeting of Russell Hydraulic Company at Chatham.

TO PUSH BUSINESS.

(Chatham World.)
Messrs. Z. Tingley, F. O. Petterson, F. J. Morley and John T. Joy, of Sydney, directors of the Russell Hydraulic Co., were in town on Tuesday, and attended meetings of the directors that were held over the J. B. Snowball Co's office. They are urging that something be done at once to test the selling quality of the patents that are controlled by the company. Mr. Russell's management is too slow to suit them, and the local directors too inert. They want to put the inventions to the test to see if they will sell. The meetings were pretty stormy. Mr. Russell, who owns 51 per cent. of the stock, tried to take charge, but he was not permitted to vote on a stock basis. He was disposed of from the presidency, and the following officers elected: Dr. Sprout, President; Z. Tingley, Vice-President; F. J. Morley, Sec'y; C. M. Russell, Asst. Sec'y; W. B. Snowball, Treas. Messrs. Sprout, Snowball, Russell, Tingley, Morley and Joy, managing committee. The directors took most of the treasury stock and put up money enough to begin operations. It was decided to go ahead at once and put the double acting hydraulic Jack on the market. The motor, for the manufacture of which the company was originally formed, has been discarded as a dream of perpetual motion.

NORTH SHORE MAN COMMITTS SUICIDE.

Samuel Kingston of Bay du Vin Took Paris Green Sunday and Died Shortly Afterward.

Samuel Kingston, of Bay du Vin committed suicide Sunday by taking a dose of paris green. The deceased, who was between sixty and seventy years old, was apparently in his usual health, and did his chores in the morning, but was found later in a dying condition, and expired about 6 o'clock in the afternoon. S. S. BANGOR IS IN TROUBLE.

Ran Down Schooner Agility While Leaving Sydney Harbor.

Halifax, N. S., May 27.—At twelve o'clock Saturday night the schooner Agility, Capt. Isadore Porier, bound from Arichat to Glace Bay with a load of railway ties, consigned to the Dominion Coal Co., was run down by steamer Bangor, steaming outward from the Intercolonial pier, Sydney, where she had been bunkering for her voyage from Miramichi to Belfast. The Bangor caught the schooner at the base of the bowsprit and carried away the cutwater and the jibboom and brought down all the head sails. The force of the impact drove the deck aft over the fore-castle over a foot and if the schooner had not been strengthened by extra heavy bow timbers she would have opened up and filled with water. The steamer came about and offered assistance, but the captain declined to accept the request. The pilot, however, notified the tug at North Sydney and the Agility was towed to the ferry wharf at that port. The Bangor left Miramichi last week.

T. W. Windsor Died Suddenly

Was A Prominent North Shore Business Man.

The sudden death occurred at New Mills Restigouche county, on Tuesday night of Mr. J. T. Windsor, a prominent resident of that place. Deceased conducted a large packing and general store business at New Mills, being one of the most prominent and best known men in that locality. He is survived by a widow and two small children. He was about forty years of age.

NEW COMPANY INVADES TERRITORY

Central Telephone Company and N. B. Telephone Company at War.

TWO NEW LINES.

The New Brunswick and Central telephone companies are very active at the present time and are hustling to complete several new lines.

The New Brunswick people and the Central are both running a telephone line from Newcastle to Bathurst, where the Central will connect with their Campbellton wire, while the N. B. Co. will extend to Campbellton.

On the North Shore the Central owns all the exchanges except Newcastle and has installed very up-to-date systems, and with the new trunk line will serve a large country. It is said, in fact, the Advocate has it on good authority that a central will be installed in Newcastle at an early date. The N. B. Company which at present controls a large amount of trunk line in the province is putting up a stiff fight to hold its own and a new line from here to Campbellton will no doubt be a great convenience.

It is said that this company has bought out the Miramichi Telephone company and that Dr. Pedolin has been appointed its North Shore Manager.

Things are certainly looking interesting in the telephone line and no doubt many improvements will be made in the local service.

STEAMER ZULU BURNED MONDAY

Was Being Repaired for Seasons Work at Power's Beach.

Messrs. John Russell & Co. met with a severe loss at an early hour Monday morning when their recently purchased steamer, Zulu which was undergoing extensive repairs at Power's beach, Lower Derby, was totally destroyed by fire.

The steamer was entirely out of water and nothing but a mass of wrecked machinery is left.

Messrs. Russell & Co. had only purchased the steamer a week or two ago and were sitting her up for towing to that the Rustler could make daily trips to Redbank.

The loss is placed at \$800 with no insurance. An effort is being made to procure another boat for towing.

HORSES TRAINING AT CHATHAM.

Chatham, N. B., May 24.—Trainer Chas. Henry, driver for Nat. McNair, has a fine string of horses in training at the Chatham driving park and on Tuesdays and Fridays he gives them their work-outs. The best time as yet for the mile was made recently by Will Be-Sure and Lady St. Croix, who work together, the track being 2:37. The track is fine and dry and the horses are coming along in great shape, so that on June 23rd and 24th when the maritime circuit opens at Moncton, the string of fast ones from this end of the province will be very much in evidence. The horses at present in training are:

Will Be-Sure, 2:19½, by Be-Sure. Lady St. Croix, 2:20½, by St. Croix. Gypsey Wilkes, 2:31½, by Abbot Wilkes. Miss J. A. Gazette, green, by Gazette. Belmar, green, by Moko Rockfarm Bill, green, by King's Council. These six horses are owned by Nat. McNair.

In addition there is Kinross, green, by Kinross, owned by Peter Archer of Chatham.

Bulger, 2:38½, by Boy Prince; owner W. B. Bevil, of St. Mary's. Victor, green, by Brazilian, owned by Mountfort Scholtes, of St. Mary's. A five year old mare by Border, belonging to J. C. Larder, Sydney, and Roman, by Roberval, owned by George Hopkins, of Springfield, N. S.

A four year old is also coming down from Campbellton for training and when this horse of Mr. Miller's is included a round dozen will be going through the regular stunts on the Chatham track.

Will Be-Sure is the pick of the bunch, but Trainer Henry thinks a lot of the work done by Lady St. Croix and he expects some of the green horses to foot the start very fast before the season is over.
