# SERIOUS ACCIDEN

Indiantown Branch Train Left the Track At Millerton, Engine Rolling Down the Bank.

FIREMAN BADLY HURT.

His Right Leg Broken In Two Places, and Hand and Head Burned -- Engineer Flung Out on Ice.

Wednesday afternoon's train on Indiantown branch (the the "Hooper") met with a serious acci-The train, consisting of dent. engine, a tank car loaded with acid for the Miller Extract Co., a box car loaded with barrels, a box car of general frieght, and a passenger car, left Newcastle at 4 p. m. Engineer Andrew McCabe was in the cab, with Cam. Smallwood as fireman, and Conductor Vye in charge of the train.

Less than half a mile this side of Millerton station, the train was just entering a curve, when Mr. McCabe noticed the forward end of the engine dip. The steam had been shut off before entering the curve. As soon as he noticed that there was something wrong, he applied the brakes and blew the whistle. Before he had time to jump or in fact do anything, the engine left the track. The side of the cab broke open, and Mr. McCabe was thrown out. The track runs right alongside the river there, and he landed on the ice. The engine plunged down the em-bankment, and turned upside down.

Mr. Smallwood was on the side to which the engine fell, and he also had not time to save himself. He was thrown down the embankment with the engine, and sustained serious injuries. His right leg was broken in two places, between the knee and ankle, and his hand and head burned and scalded, from the escaping steam and the flame from the firebox.

He was watching the track at the time and it seemed to be all right. Edward Kane, the section foreman, was over the track about half a hour before the train was due, and it seemed to be in pertect condition

It is thought that the heavy rain had undermined it under one side, and weakened it so that when the weight of the engine came on it, it sagged. About four rail lengths were damaged on one side, A steam crane was sent from Moncton and is now working at the wreck. A temporary track has been built around, and the regular trains were running yesterday.


