During July and August Bags Increased by 16 Per Cent.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—The increase in the British newspapers and magazines coming into Canada as a result of the reduction of the postage is phenomenal. The total increase in the number of bags coming into Canada from Great Britain during the months of July and August as compared with the corresponding figures of 1905 is 152 per cent., and the number for the months of July and August, 1907, being 2,129 bags, while for the same months in 1907 there were 5,539 bags.

In Toronto there were 379 bags received during the months of July and August, 1906, during the same months of 1907, the number was 1,048, an increase of 689 bags or 171 per cent.
