Programme of Construction Laid by China.

London, Sept. 28.—Chinese advices

from a trustworthy source give interesting facts concerning the plans for the relag facts concerning the plans for the reorganization of the Chinese navy, which
have been approved by imperial decree
and on which work has already begun.
On account of the vast expenditure involved the work will be spread over seven years. The most striking items will
be carried out from 1911 to 1916, when
the Government will have built eight
first-class battleships, twenty cruisers,
ten gunboats and three flotillas of torpédo boats.

China intends to proceed immediately to develop naval bases, expand the naval schools and enlarge the dockyards. She also plans the creation of an admiralty board and the establishment of a new naval academy, and to recruit a force of marines.

As regards the troops, he consilers that the German cavalry is superfor, especially being better horsed. Out he says: "Fine as is the German infantry. I believe ours is quite as good." The British infantry gave him the impression that they were keener and quicker.

STUFFED MUSHROOMS.

Scrape out the inside of the cups, chop the stems that are too long to be left standing, and also the mushrooms, which should have been arranged in a battered earthen dish, stems up. Then cover with the glass bells that come on purpose for holding in the delicate aroma and juices of the mushrooms, or, lacking these, with paper and an inverted pan. Cook on the back of the stove, or in an oven for about an hour, or until brown and tender. They will cook in their own juices. Serve on rounds of toast with a seasoning of butter, salt and paprika.

One cupful sugar, two eggs, one-fourth cupful of butter, one-half cupful of lard, one cupful of sour cream, one-half teaspoonful of salt, two cupfuls of flour, one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder, a tiny bit of soda on end of coom, and flavoring to taste.

Cream filling: One cupful of sugar, one egg, one and one-half cupfuls of sweet milk, one teaspoonful of vanilla, one heaping teaspoonful of flour. Mix sugar, flour, and eggs, stir in hot milk, and boil until thick; spread between layers and ice with two teaspoonfuls of sweet milk thickened with powdered sugar.

MAYONNAISE DRESSING. Take three eggs, separate whites from yolks; beat white to a stiff froth; add one-half teaspoonful dry mustard, sugard one tablespoonful salt, and one tablespo ar, pepper, salt, and one tablespoonful of oil to yokks of egg; beat well together, and add the beaten whites. Then take one cupful of vinegar, place on fire, and let it boil; remove from stove and stir in the other ingredients; place back on fire; let it cook slowly until it thickens; stirring all the time. Then let it cool, and when cool add one-half cupful of cream; beat all up well. This will keep for a week at a time if kept on the ice.
