WALTERS or FARRIS ALBERT.—A correspondent of an American paper states that Prince Albert is building a plantation residence at Baltimore, and goes on to speak of his income and expenses as follows:—He brought no money to England. It is true, but recollect that from February 10, 1849, Prince Albert has had an income of £30,000, that as Field Marshall he receives £15 5s. per day extra, that he has the pay and emoluments of two colonelcies that he is a ranger of Windsor Park, and that every appointment has been heaped upon him which he decently can hold, his actual income is over £60,000, a year, out of which his expenditure is not £1,000 a year. In fact his savings already exceeds half a million sterling, a very small portion of which he retains in England. A part is invested in the public securities of Holland, part in the French rentes, part in the United States securities, and I dare say that the house of the Messrs. Baring in New York, could tell you—but they won't—how much they have invested in real property in New York.
