IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.

The Irish University Bill Read a First Time.

Details of the Proposed Scheme.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer reserves his opinion on the bill until the 29th inst. The bill was read a first time in the House of Commons to-day. The bill is introduced by Mr. Stansfeld, and is entitled "The Irish University Bill." EUROPE.

NATIVE LAWLESSNESS IN INDIA.

Robbery and Incendiarism by Armed Gangs.

Simla, May 19.—Dacoity, or robbery by armed gangs, is assuming alarming proportions in the Punjab district. For some time past bands of dacoits have been scouring the country, committing daring attacks on houses and villages. They seem to form part of a regular organization under the command of Waseed Ali Buland, lately a clerk in the Financial Department. They are supposed to have set the fire which destroyed the Government school, Boodwar palace, law courts, post-office and fifty houses in Poonah on the 13th inst. In a remarkable manifesto they inform the Government that great distress prevails in the country, and unless extensive public works are opened, employment will be wanting for the thousands of Europeans out there, they will extend to the matter in the hands of the local police confined to natives; they will kill the Government of the Punjab, and they will murder and burn throughout the country. The manifesto ends with a warning to the Government that unless they comply, a price of one thousand rupees will be put on the head of each person, including the Governor, who signed their signatures and seals. The Government, which at first was inclined to leave the matter in the hands of the local police, is now taking more energetic measures. A considerable number of troops have been ordered to patrol the country, and a reward of one thousand rupees has been offered for the capture of Waseed Ali.
