TORONTO ITEMS.

Customs Returns.—The total amount of the duty collected at the custom house during the month of February was \$390,500 compared with the same period last year \$302,077.05, showing an increase in favour of this year of \$88,422.95.

The Immigration List.—During the last month 145 immigrants arrived in the city of whom 94 were English, 44 Irish, and 47 from other countries. The number of arrivals through to Montreal was 107, and 38 through to Toronto. Between 120 and 150 immigrants for Ontario are coming by the s.s. Manhattan, which is expected at Halifax tomorrow.

Removal of Abattoirs.—A company under the name of the Toronto Abattoirs, which has been formed with a capital of \$100,000, and has been authorized to erect slaughter houses for the city of Toronto, is now in the hands of the law.

The Export of Potatoes.—The potato crop of the South-western States has been turned out as well last season as in previous years. Chicago and St. Louis are drawing heavily on the crop. Monday men were busy loading a Great Western train at the foot of Market street. It was made up of ten cars, and the hundreds of bushels of potatoes which are being shipped to the West.
