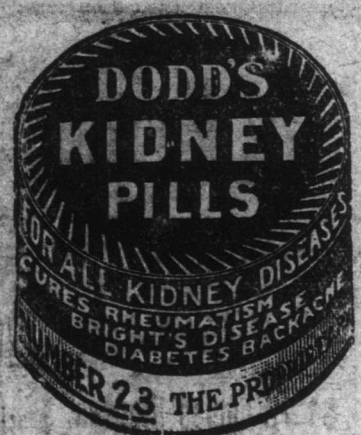

Sons of Peers as Engineers.

Hon. Charles Stewart Rolls, who made the latest sensational record in aerial flight and whose wonderful career we made reference to yesterday is not the only son of a peer, who has gained eminence in mechanical pursuits, the Hon. Charles A. Parsons is even more eminent in Engineering. Rolls is the son of a Welsh landowner. Parsons is the son of an Irish peer who made a name in the scientific world and became President of the Royal Society. He is the fourth son of the third Earl of Rosse, who built the famous telescope.

Charles Parsons was a Cambridge Mathematical scholar who took to engineering and found recreation in rowing. He is a Doctor of Science and has been elected a member of the Royal Society. He is who has revolutionized the propulsion of war and mercantile vessels.

Parsons invented what is known as the Parsons' compound steam turbine in 1884. In 1885 he began to manufacture them.

In 1892 they became competitors of the best reciprocating engines. In 1897 those engines were tried on a vessel, the Turbinia. The torpedo boat Viper was the first war vessel in which they were installed. She attained a speed of 36.58 knots. Then in 1901 they were applied to a passenger vessel called the King Edward. The Allan Line's Victorian and Virginian were the two first Atlantic liners installed with the Parsons turbines.

Now the largest and fastest passenger steamers in the world, the Lusitania and the Mauretania are fitted with Parsons' turbines, and so are the dreadnoughts.

Parsons is a proprietor of one large engineering and electrical works and managing director of another.

The Mildred in Port

The schr. Mildred, Capt. Wiltshire, arrived to-day from Oporto with 100 bds. of cork wood. She made the run out in 25 days and Wednesday night was off Ferryland in thick fog which continued until 2 Francis light. On the third of May Francis light. On the third of May a night when 40 miles off Oporto, and when the vessel was head-reaching with a strong N. wind and heavy sea but fine and clear, a large steamer from the north bore down on the ship while the Mildred was reaching W.N. V. and it was seen that as the steamer did evidently no one on the look-out a collision was inevitable. Capt. Wiltshire put his helm hard a star-board to run before the wind but it was too late. The big ship's port quarter hit the vessel on the star-board bow coming almost full speed and carried away the cabin, bow rail, three knees in the light-head and did considerable damage to the extent of £10 stig. The Mildred narrowly escaped being sunk and the steamer whose name the captain did not ascertain carried on her course and did not attempt to stop and render aid if it were necessary. Capt. Wiltshire believes it was a British ship as he heard men cry out on her decks in the English language.

Will Demand More Wages.

We learn from good authority to-day that the members of the laborers union in the near future will ask for an increase of pay all round. Barrow men on the wharves get 14 cents per hour and the ordinary laborers 12 cents. The union will try and abolish the hour system and the men will demand 20 and 15 cents. The longshore men on the steamers get 18 cents per hour for the day and 23 cents after ten till midnight. They will demand 20 and 25 cents per hour and will not ask an advance over the forty cents per hour which they get after midnight. The matter has already been pretty thoroughly discussed in the union.

The Canada Arrives

The Canada arrived here yesterday at 5 p.m. from Barbadoes, molasses laden, to Steer Bros., after a run of 33 days. For the past 12 days the vessel has been on the shore waiting for the fog to lift between Cape Race and Cape Spear. It was a tedious and anxious time for all on board and as the Telegram has already stated a Placentia man volunteered to leave the ship in a boat, rowed to Cape Spear and procured the John Green but the tug did not go far enough to sea to fetch the ship. The ship was reaching back and forth on the coast till yesterday and heard the whistles of the several steamers which were in the offing. The capt. and crew are well.

Broke in the Door.

A fellow tried to break into Mr. Tucker's house on Hamilton St. last evening while the house-keeper was out. He used a handspike and tried to pry open the door. He succeeded in bursting the lock off the door, and forced the cleats off where a bar rested. The Strathcona.

The Deep Sea Mission ship Strathcona, Dr. Grenfell in charge, arrived here Thursday evening from St. Anthony via Seidom-Come-Bye. She left Saturday morning last and proceeded to Canada Bay with the mails. The ship reached Seidom-Come-Bye last Sunday and remained there four days waiting for fog to clear up. The crew bring the report that there is a good sign of fish at Grenadaire, traps had about five barrels each there one day last week; good sign of salmon, herring plentiful. About 500 barrels were taken in nets the past winter between Cape Norman and St. Anthony. They were brought up in the schooner Darrell which arrived last night. The Strathcona will be fitted up for the Labrador Mission and will sail in about three weeks time.

Man Lying on Road

James Walsh who came in from the Power House, at Petty Harbor, this morning saw a man lying on the road side near the Reid Nld. Co. quarry. He was lying on the grass, and had no stockings on his feet. When Mr. Walsh drew near to speak to him the mysterious stranger turned away his head and muttered some intelligible words, and did not want to be spoken to. Mr. Walsh thinks that he is a deserter from a vessel or a passenger from the Mongolian.

Big Cut of Lumber.

There was a big cut of lumber for Dr. Grenfell's mill at Roddington, Canada Bay, the past winter, about 10,000 logs were cut. The mill will be set going on full time in a few days and the output will be the largest since operations began there.
