that is perfectly plain, and yet I know
many men who virtually answer it the
other way by worrying about a change
of management.

I should think that any self-respect-
ing man would be ashamed to worry
about a change of management in his
office.

For such a worry can mean but one
thing—that he feels his position de-
pends partly on favor and not wholly
on his ability to do his work.

Such a man probably thinks he is
lucky in having a soft snap, but he
isn't.

Quite the contrary.
Just the other day I heard a big
business man say "There is no man I
prize more than the man who is earn-
ing more than he is worth. He thinks
he is lucky, but he really is just the
opposite for he is always in line for
a big job, and once he's adrift with
his false estimate of himself and his
blatant standard of living, there is no

telling when he'll get a chance to
anchor again."

Does your position depend wholly
upon your ability to do the work?

If it does, no matter what you are
getting, you have one big reason to be
thankful. Admire, and emulate if you
can, the man who is earning twice
what you are because he has the
brains to do so, but don't envy the
man who is getting good money be-
cause he has a soft snap. Pity him.

And above all don't worry about
holding your position.

If you want to worry, worry about
being capable of doing the work as
perfectly as it could be done.

Remember that no change of man-
agement ever effects the thoroughly
good worker.

Even if it should, it wouldn't mat-
ter, for the whole world has need of
him.

As a wise philosopher or work puts
it:

"If a man can write a better book,
preach a better sermon or make a bet-
ter mousetrap than his neighbour, the
world will make a beaten path to his
door."

P. S. You may have noticed that I
omitted to name the "wise philosopher
of work." I did that for a reason. I
don't know his name and if anyone
can tell me from whom that quota-
tion is taken I will be very grateful
for I have never been able to place it.

It is often ascribed to Emerson but

Household Notes.

To prevent possible accidents from
the chafing dish, wrap a towel from
water and lay just inside the rim of
the tray and outside the feet of the
dish. With this, any sudden flaming
up can be readily extinguished.

To keep a skirt placket from tear-
ing out at the bottom sew on a hook
and eye at the extreme end of the
placket, fasten and then crush flat.
This is a simple, but very useful thing
to know, as it saves many a stitch.

Bags to protect light dresses are a
help to people who live in smoky,
dusty cities. Make them of calico as
long as the garment and run a tape in
the top. Slip the gown on a hamper
and put it in the bag, draw the tape
and hang up.

Often in new homes plaster will be
found on floors. Labor can be saved
if before scrubbing the floor is rubbed
over with vinegar. This will remove
stains at once where it would take
several scrubbing of water to re-
move same.

Many people are troubled by hav-
ing the starch stick to flatirons. Boil
the starch well, then stir it a minute
with an ordinary paraffin candle. Use
the starch while it is still warm. The
paraffin keeps the starch from stick-
ing.

To whiten linen that has become
yellow from lying away, wash and
rub soap all over and without wring-
ing put in the sun when dry wet
thoroughly again. One day in the
sun will make it as white as when
new. Rinse and hang up.

Waste paper and other articles may
be burned with safety in a gas grate.

A double sheet of asbestos paper be-
fore laid over the holes. This is lifted
out later and will do away with the
necessity of cleaning the ashes from
the grate.

By placing a large carriage sponge
in the bottom of an umbrella jar you
will avoid striking the bottom of the
jar, which is often broken in this way.
The sponge will also absorb the water
from an umbrella. It may afterward
be wrung out.

Has anyone tried cooking sausage
with baked beans instead of salt pork?
They should be almost covered by
the beans when put in the oven. The
fat in them blends with the beans bet-
ter than pork, and the sausages when
cooked are dry and delicious.

I find my silk petticoats wear out
on the seams first. I take silk seam
binding same shade of skirt and base
on right side over each seam, then
stitch with silk thread on both sides of
binding, and find it gives new life to a
worn-out petticoat.

Freeze-dried chicken, or chicken to be
used as salad, is much better if cooked
a day before it is to be served. Let
the meat remain in the liquor until
ready to use. The chicken will ab-
sorb much of the flavor of the juice
and will be that much tastier.

To put new braid on a skirt where
hem is stitched in, rip out hem for
about three inches and insert a two-
inch piece of pasteboard a little wider
than braid; by slipping this along the
new braid is easily sewed on without
catching outer part of skirt.

The Picnic Party Extravagance.

The Magisterial Salaries of Mr. Main
Raised from \$300 per year under
Bond to \$1,050 under Morris.

Dear Mr. Editor,—Just a few lines
from Harbor Main to express the
fews of fishermen who are after
tricking hard luck at the fisheries and
finding out the truth of the old say-
ing, "Tory times are hard times." The
present Government seems to be the
most extravagant Government that we
ever had. If the same extravagance is
going on over the country as in Har-
bor Main, then we will be on the
socks in a few years, and Confedera-
tion will be the only hope for us,
reaping what we sow.

For the past thirteen
years we had Magistrate Murray per-
forming the duties of his office and
giving satisfaction to all; his salary
was \$200 per year. Mr. Murray is a
well preserved, healthy, active man
under sixty. Mr. Murray is pension-
ed at full salary, and a Mr. O'Toole,
a Tory candidate, is appointed as Mr.
Murray's successor at a salary of
\$750 per year; so that in this Harbor
Edward is paying one thousand
and fifty dollars for magisterial work
that was done under Sir Robert Bond
or three hundred dollars. What sur-
prises us about such transactions is
that men like Hon. R. K. Bishop and
many supporters of his type, who
are some state in the country, can
be a party to such transactions. It
is rather hard on poor fishermen who
come home from Labrador to see
\$1,050 of the taxpayers' money paid
out for magisterial work, while dur-
ing all the years of plenty under the
liberal party \$300 was paid.

Mr. J. B. Veitch, telegraph operator,
is leaving here next Bruce train to go
to Western Canada. He was a good
official, but could not live on the
meager salary paid him, so you can
see, Mr. Editor, that while one class
of officials gets big pay, another gets
starvation.

We notice that the Government have
three Agricultural Lecturers at a
salary of \$150.00 per month; we think
that this is a big scandal to see three
Members of the House of Assembly
subsidized to talk Agriculture when
even the school children know that
not one of them has any practical
knowledge of the subject.

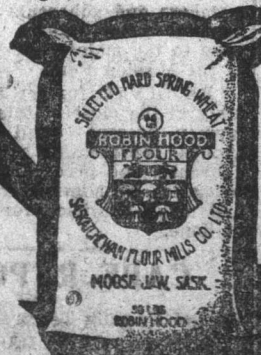
