Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 25. The third of such brilliant Courtis as are marking the present London season was held at Buckingham Palace last night. The Colonial delegates to the Imperial Conference were well represented, while most of the members of the foreign embassies and a host of officials were present. Another court will be held to-morrow evening.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 25. It is stated to-day by one of the leading men of the Seamen and Firemen's Union that the "longshoremen of America have agreed to come out and help the International Seamen's strike. The date of the strike is not yet announced, but it is understood that it will occur during the Coronation week.

Special to Evening Telegram. EDINBURGH, May 25. Applause welcomed a message from President Taft on the subject of Anglo-American Arbitration, when read before the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland to-day. Taft's message voiced his well-known enthusiasm for a practically unlimited arbitration treaty, and he added, "Say to the Assembly it is my sincere desire that Canada shall continue to prosper, flying the British flag and sharing with us the responsibility for North American civilization." A motion hailing the proposed Arbitration Treaty was adopted.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 25. The Duke of Connaught spoke on Colonial affairs at an Empire Day banquet in the Royal Colonial Institute last night. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was among the Premiers present, spoke of Canada's revenge on the States for having in previous years drawn away Canada's population. There are now in Canada, he said, more than a million loyal subjects of the King, who a few years ago were American citizens. We have turned the tables upon the American Republic, he exclaimed. The nineteenth century was the day of the States, the twentieth will be the day of Canada.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 25. The Imperial Conference to-day turned down a proposal of Premier Ward of New Zealand favouring the constitution of an Imperial Council of State, with representatives of all self-governing British Dominions, to act in an advisory capacity to the Imperial Government. The proposal met with no support and was withdrawn after two days' debate. The first step in the direction of the federation of the British Empire is thus postponed.

Western Notes.

(Western Star.) The schr. E. Morrissey sailed Sunday week with a cargo of herring for Gloucester. It would take about 300 lobstersters of the size sold at ten cents each on Saturday to fill a case.

A party of New York capitalists have received an option on some timber limits at Corner Brook.

The Pew-Gorton Co. of Gloucester will install a 25 h.p. gasoline motor in the schr. Verbera. This craft will be used by the company for towing schooners and boats about the Bay and as a pay boat in their prosecution of the herring fishery.

Lobster packers will send their catch to Halifax, St. John's, or elsewhere, spend their time in packing, shipping, etc., pay for cases, cans, solder, freight, insurance, commission, etc., and sell at from \$15 to \$17 per case. But to sell them in the local market without any expense, such as cases, cans, freight, insurance, commission, etc., they charge at the rate of about \$30.00 per case.

Unless we get a big fall of rain, Mr. C. Fisher is likely to be considerably hampered in the operation of his saw mill this season. Of his winter's cut of about 7,000 pieces he has only about 2,000 pieces to the mill; the balance of the cut being hung up about a half mile up the river. Eight or ten hours of heavy rain, however, would likely raise the river sufficiently to liberate the logs.

Labor Day Parade.

The Trades and Labour Council had a special meeting last night in the British Hall to arrange for the Labour Day parade and festivities. Mr. M. Colbert, President of the Council, presided, and representatives were present from the Coopers, Longshoremen's, Carpenters, Bricklayers and Mesons, Tinsmiths, Bakers and Tailors' Unions. It was decided to hold the parade and sports on Wednesday, July 5th, and an elaborate programme will be later outlined.

OTTAWA, May 25. The Government will call for tenders in a few days for the extension of the harbour works of St. John, N.B., totalling a cost of \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000. A first class dry dock will be built, with an extensive ship-repairing plant in connection. Several companies, backed by British capital, are ready to tender for the whole of the proposed works.

LOBSTER FISHERY.—The lobster fishery in Placentia and Fortune Bays is now in full swing. The fish are of a fairly large size, and the men engaged in this occupation expect to do well.

Coronation Festivities.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—We have been reminded that on the occasion of the Diamond Jubilee in 1897, a most successful Children's Festival was held, and the feeling is growing that in the approaching Coronation ceremonies the children of the city should find themselves remembered. I think it only right that the public should know that His Majesty the King's representative in this Colony has for some time been engaged in an effort to have the children included in the public functions of the Coronation. Some three weeks ago His Excellency invited the Superintendents of Education to meet him to whom he expressed a wish that something should be done for the children, and of whom he sought advice.

After several proposals had been considered, it was thought that His Excellency's desire would be best served if something could be done to touch the children of the Colony as a whole, and not those of the city only. A happy idea then came to His Excellency, namely that he should send a message to all the children of the Colony, and that it should be read with due ceremony in every school at the closing of the session on the evening of Wednesday, the 21st of June, a holiday of two days being proclaimed. The proposal commended itself very strongly to the Superintendents, and His Excellency's message is now in course of preparation.

It is probable that in every settlement some arrangement will be made for the purpose of impressing upon the young the significance of the Coronation, and of affording them some suitable means of rejoicing. Here in the Capital, it becomes us to take the lead. Time is passing; it is a busy season of the year, and we are all much engrossed in our daily duties; we have not paused sufficiently, perhaps, to think of the preparation that must be made if, during the Coronation season, we are to join the world-wide circle of rejoicing hearts.

The spirit of patriotism must not be allowed to slumber idle or heedless. If we value our glorious heritage and we must see to it that we plant it strong and active, deep in the bosoms of our children. I do not think that I shall be giving any secret away if I say that I believe His Excellency is still anxious that the children of St. John's should have something appropriate provided for themselves, and I really think he is longing to have an opportunity of saying a few stirring words to them in his whole-souled fashion. As a citizen, I cordially endorse the idea of a Children's Festival, which, if necessary, could be held on the Saturday.

In Sinking Condition.

The Mary Jane left here last Tuesday for St. Lawrence with a cargo of salt for C. F. Bennett & Co. Before rounding Cape Race the N. E. gale had buffeted the ship so badly that she sprung a leak. The crew manned the pumps and worked without stopping all day Wednesday in order to prevent the water from gaining on them. It was an uneasy time for all as it was feared that the salt might choke the pumps. The captain decided to run for Trepassay which he did safely, the crew being tired out from continuous work at the pumps. The salt cargo is now being taken out and the leak will be stopped there if possible. If not the schooner will return to St. John's to be docked.

Man Frozen to Death.

Letters received yesterday from Rigolette state that on New Year's Eve a man named Thos. Pallier, a native, was found frozen to death in a camp which he used. He generally travelled over the country for the Hudson Bay Co. agent, but succumbed to the severe weather prevailing. The winter in that section was a very severe one with many storms. For three months the glass recorded with little intermission from 15 to 30 degrees below zero. The agent of the Hudson Bay Co. suffered severely in his travels over the coast in the interest of the company, at times being barely able to keep himself from freezing to death. The health of the people was fairly good, except on the other side of Sandwich Bay, where scarlet fever was epidemic for a while.
