LONDON, To-day.  
The Bishop of Norwich, Dr. Sheepshears, is dead.

TUSCON, Arizona, To-day.  
The Taft and Roosevelt delegations held a state convention in the same hall. Each elected 6 delegates to the Chicago Convention.

FEZ, To-day.  
It was announced the tribesmen were completely routed by a strong French column. The tribesmen held positions, 6 miles outside of Fez. It is estimated that 600 of them were killed. The situation in Fez is greatly improved.

LIEGE, Belgium, To-day.  
Serious disorders occurred here last evening. The worst clash took place in front of the Socialist Club, where a meeting had just concluded. Gen-darmes were forced to use firearms. Three men were killed and 15 wounded. A demonstration also occurred in front of the City Hall. Riotous mob demanded the release of one of their number arrested. Street cars were derailed, windows smashed, gen-darmes and police charged repeatedly. Many people were hurt.

COLOMBUS, To-day.  
Brown, manager of the Roosevelt campaign in Ohio, was re-elected chairman of the State Republican Central Committee. In a vote for temporary chairman, however, which was a tie vote Brown was defeated by vote 11 to 10. Resolutions of the committee voted to report an endorsement of the Taft administration to the convention to-day. The resolution reads: "We do heartily endorse the administration of President Taft." Roosevelt members announced they will introduce a minority report endorsing that of the former President.

Signs of the Dock strike collapsing are in evidence. Double the number of men are working of those on Saturday. Ship-owners assert they have all the free labor they need. The only thing which prevents the complete breaking-up of the strike is the fact that lightermen under an old charter possess a monopoly at their class of work and therefore cannot be replaced. This knowledge stiffened the backs of the employees. Their conference with the Government came to naught. They refused to entertain the Government's proposals of compulsory arbitration.

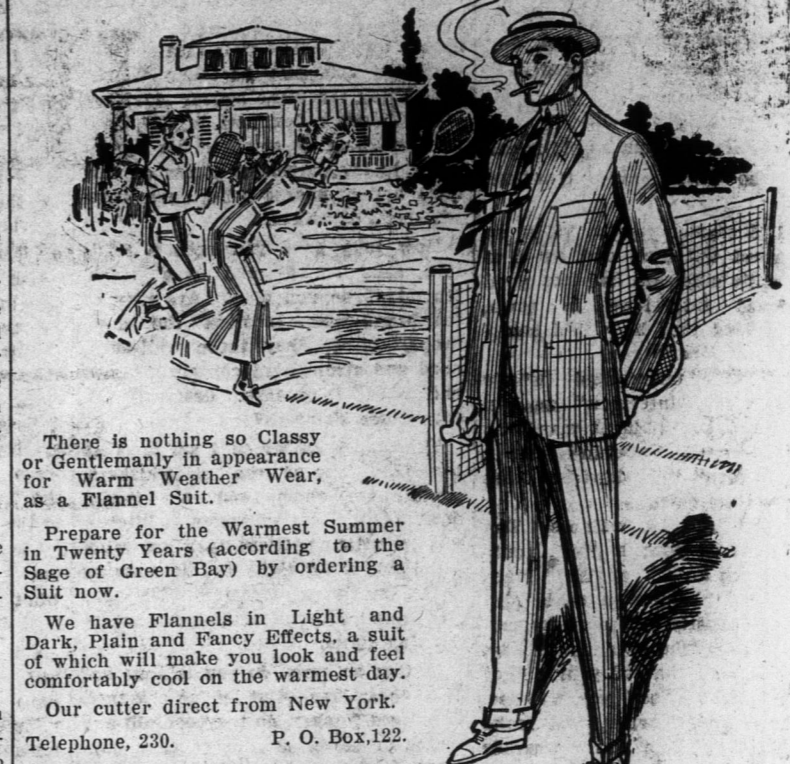

The vessel floated off quickly and temporary repairs were effected to prevent her from leaking. Capt. Martyn passed over the same place scores of times but never met a mishap before.
