Unionists Offer Amendments

LONDON, Feb. 17.

Tariff Reform and Welsh Disestablishment were the subjects of two amendments to the Speech from the Throne offered in the Commons last night. On the former the Unionists again gave adherence to the Chamberlainian panacea. On the latter the Government's majority was only 62, this being gained by the help of the Nationalists. The significance of this is that if the votes of English members alone were taken into consideration the Government would have been defeated. Captain Tryon, M.P., for Brighton, and Page Croft, M.P., for Christchurch, presented an amendment, regretting that the Government had refused to modify the Fiscal system by imposing a moderate tariff on imported goods, manufactured in a foreign country, with preference to British Dominions. Capt. Tryon twitted Attorney General Simon for stamping the country, and holding divers funerals over the remains. Tariff Reform had been killed by Sir John Simon and his consorts, but it was far from dead. Page Croft attacked the Free Trade arguments in a lengthy speech, and attempted to show that Germany had tripled its output of manufactured articles during the last thirty years. England, on the other hand, had only doubled her output of such articles during the same period. Tariff reformers were deliberately out for higher wages. Lloyd, M.P., for West Staffordshire, pointed out the danger of the Dominions framing their own protective treaties. Canada had built a chain of inter-Dominion trade arrangements. Australia had followed in a steady policy of Imperial preference. Imperial interests might become conflicting. The Solicitor General characterized the policy reflected by the amendment as rudimentary and a devitalized fragment of the larger fragment of the Tariff Reform. Bonar Law reiterated his intention of carrying out fiscal reform, if returned to power. The amendment was defeated by a Government majority of 74. The debate on the Welsh Disestablishment Bill was introduced by Mr. Ormesby Gore, in an amendment regretting that the Government intended to put the Bill through though there was no popular support emanating from it. Mr. Balfour, in an impressive speech, charged the Unionists with having attempted to divert public attention by offering a new measure to obscure the present one. The general opinion was growing hostile, he said, to the application of religious funds for secular purposes.

Orange Marmalade.

To make good orange marmalade choose juicy oranges with thick skin. Wash and weigh them. For every pound of oranges allow two pounds of sugar, one quart of water and two tablespoonsful of lemon juice. Put the oranges in a half. Squeeze out all the juice with a lemon squeezer. Ring off all the juice with a little of the measured water. Let the skins stand overnight in unmeasured water. Next morning pour away the water and remove the stringy part. Pass the solid skin through a meat grinder, or cut it into the finest shreds with a pair of scissors or sharp-pointed knife.

Some makers remove the whitest part altogether. This makes the marmalade less bitter. It is true, but it will not "jell" as well, and there is danger of insipidity. Rinse the cut up peels or not, according to whether or not you prefer a "full flavored" or milder marmalade. Put the cut-up peels into a preserving kettle with the proper measure of water (above) and the orange and lemon juice and cook until the peel looks quite soft and swollen and is easily pierced with a blunt skewer. The liquid will reduce somewhat. Now add the sugar and cook until the syrup "jells," when tried on a cold plate the bits of peel tend to stick below the surface. Then skim and put up in glasses like jelly.

The jelly part should be rather firm and quite clear, and the peels should not float on the surface of the glass. If less peel is liked and more jelly remove some of the peel (toward the end of the process) by "fishing" for it with a small sieve and finish off this extra peel separately by "candy-ing."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.

MADRID, Feb. 17.

WOODSHALL, Man., Feb. 17.
The French trans-Atlantic steamer "Roma," with passengers and cargo for New York from Spanish ports, is reported by wireless to be ashore on Norman's Land, a small island 10 miles south of Gay Head, Martha's Vineyard. Assistance has been sent out.

LONDON, Feb. 17.
A Berlin despatch to the Daily Mail says that the terms which Austria dictated to the steamship pool is an indispensable condition of allowing them to do business in Austria. They will not transport any Austrian migrants, male or female, between 7 and 25.

LONDON, Feb. 17.
The Parliamentary correspondent of the Daily Chronicle understands that the Naval Estimates for the next financial year will exceed two hundred and fifty million, over and above the fifteen million in last year's supplementary estimates. Lord Crewe, who hitherto had been somewhat of a dark horse on the question of increase of armaments, speaking before the members of the Eighty Club, gave unqualified support to Winston Churchill's position.

QUEENSTOWN, Feb. 17.
Such storms have prevailed on the North Atlantic during the past week, that many passenger steamers and cargo boats were unable to battle against the strong winds on their way to America, and have been compelled to turn round and run for shelter to ports on this side of the Atlantic. Three large steamers are returning in a battered condition, including the Niagara. The big Dutch H tank Rotterdam, when eight days out from Amsterdam to New York, lost her rudder and was forced to make for Queenstown in tow of a steam trawler. Another steam trawler is towing the British steamer Croedel from Barry to Malta, which lost her propeller off the Spanish coast, on Thursday.
