His Excel-lency announced that the Majors recently appointed to the Newfoundland Regiment have already taken up their duties. He spoke of the good work done by the Aeroplane Committee and paid a worthy tribute to the patriot-ism of those who contributed to the Fund. He also referred to England's

appreciation of her oldest colony's gifts, mention of which has already been made in the Press. He then read the accompanying letter from Sir Spencer Ewart, the Commanding Of-ficer of the forces in Scotland:---Headquarters Scottish Command,

Edinburgh, 19th July, 1915.

Dear Sir Walter Davidson,— I am very much obliged for your Excellency's kind letter of July 1st. I can assure you that it has been a very great pleasure and henour to me to have had the Newfoundland Regiment under my orders during its period of training in this country. When the Battalion first arrived it was quartered at Fort George, but subsequently I moved it to Edinburgh as it seemed appropriate from an Im-perial point of view that the sold-iers of Newfoundland should garri-

son our ancient Castle for 'a time. The battalion is now at Stob's Camp, near Hawick, on the borders, where it has made good progress in its training, and I have lately recommended that it shall be moved to England to be incorporated in a Brigade, prior to

proceeding upon active service. The battalion has conducted itself o my entire satisfaction, and I have he authority of the Lord Prevost of Edinburgh for saying that its pres-ence in our Scottish capital has been much appreciated by the people. The Lord Provost himself was present at the station to welcome your officers and men in the name of the City of Edinburgh on their arrival here from Fort George.


