Denominational Ratio.

We copy the following denomina-
tional percentage of enlistments in
the Royal Newfoundland Regiment
from a despatch dated St. John's
N.F., Sept. 3, cabled or written To-
ronto and published in a weekly jour-
nal of good standing in that city on
Sept. 12th. The extract is quoted ver-
batim: "The total membership of
each religious denomination in 1911
and the numbers of each who volun-
teered up to June 28th last, are as
follows: Church of Rome, member-
ship 31,779; Volunteers, 1639; Church
of England, membership 78,618; Vol-
unteers, 2044; Methodist, member-
ship, 68,042; Volunteers, 1818; Sal-
vation Army, membership 10,141;
Volunteers, 265. The percentage en-
listing from each church, per thous-
and of population, is, according to
this table—Church of Rome, 20.02;
Church of England, 26.00; Methodist,
26.72; Salvation Army, 26.61." We do
not assume the responsibility for the
compilation of these figures, merely
reprinting them from the Toronto
journal in the public interest.

T. P. U. Meeting

The executive of the Truckmen's
Protective Union held their regular
meeting last evening when the pro-
posed new tariff came up for discus-
sion. The matter of handling the
R. N. Co.'s freight bills on the ship-
ments of goods carted by the Union
was also discussed, carmen complain-
ing that they usually pay the freight
bills on shipments of goods they cart,
which means delay and loss of time
without remuneration. The executive
did not arrive at a decision on either
matter discussed, but on Monday
night, at the annual meeting of the
Union, both will be further consid-
ered and possibly finalized.

Accidental Shooting.

On Thursday last, at Lewisporte,
operator Power, son of Constable
Power, was accidentally shot in the
leg by a small boy who was playing
"soldier" on the platform at the rail-
way station, having in his possession
a 22 calibre gun and as usual pulled
the trigger not knowing at the time
that the gun was loaded. The bullet
entered Power's right leg above the
knee passing near the bone and lodg-
ing in the back of the leg. No doc-
tor being present to extract the bul-
let the injured man decided to come to
the city for treatment, and reached
here by yesterday's express being
subsequently taken to the hospital.
